This Company owns 100 acres in fee and 7,000 acres of coal rights in Barbour county, W. Va.

The fee property is situated at Lillian, a station on the Grafton & Bealington Railroad, branch of the B. & O. Lillian is four miles south of Philippi, the county seat of Barbour county. The property fronts for three-quarters of a mile directly on the rail road and Tygerts Valley River, and including 60 acres of land suitable for sidings, miners' houses, tipples and other improvements needed in mining the coal.

There is now on the property two substantial houses, with stable, store-house, etc. Siding already constructed and the upper Freeport vein is now being worked, and the coal shipped to market. The property contains the Reynolds vein or vein No. 1, the Masontown or No. 2, the upper Freeport or No. 3, the lower Freeport or No. 4, and the Kittaning or No. 5.

All of the above veins are open and ready for inspection except the Kittaning, which is below water level, but can be easily tested. Starting on the rail road and with the front of about three-quarters of a mile, the property runs three and a half miles to the Sugar Creek Valley, and from the Northern outline of the property, extending six miles south.

The property has been recently examined by Prof. Sam'l R. Brown, who occupies the Chair of Geology at the University of W. Va., and his report which is appended shows the position and character of the coals.

The analysis was made by Mr. A. P. Romine, of Johns Hopkins University, and shows a very low percentage of sulphur. These coals are said by both of these gentlemen to be very valuable deposits.

Report of Samuel C. Brown, Professor of Geology of West Virginia University.

The following is a rather brief account of a coal field owned and optioned by your company, situate about four (4) miles above Philippi and extending from the Tygart's Valley River eastward in a continuous block to the waters of Sugar Creek in Barbour county, West Virginia.

The topography of this district is as follows: The railroad level along the river front is about 1,400 feet above the sea, Philippi being 1,288 feet above tide. The river hills on either side rise to a height of about 300 feet above the railroad in rather steep bluffs. Here a plateau is reached which rises gradually to the eastward until at a distance of two to three miles it is about 200 feet higher than the top of the bluffs fronting the river, or 500 feet above the railroad. We then begin to descend until in another mile we have reached the valley of Sugar Creek, some 200 feet lower

than the top of the plateau, but still about 300 feet higher than the level of the rail road along the river. The streams that take their rise on this plateau have not sunken their channels to great depths, but flow in shallow valleys until the edge of the plateau is reached on eithe side, when they plunge down to the river in narrow gorges with a rapid fall. The little streams that flow toward Sugar Creek have a slighter fall and wider valleys. Sugar Creek itself is a stream of some importance with a broad valley, flowing to the north-west and emptying into the Tygart's Valley river at Arden, several miles north of Philippi.

So the coal field mentioned above has railroad transportation along its river front, and the possibility of another line of easy construction down the valley of Sugar Creek, joining the present railroad at Arden

The topography being now explained, the geology will be considered. This is also simple and easy to describe. The rocks are stratified and are not level, but have a somewhat uniform rise of 100 feet to the mile to the southeast. This gradual rise of the strata east and south-east brings the rocks and coals that were near the railroad level along the river front also near the surface, and some of them above the surface back on Sugar Creek. So that although Sugar Creek is some 300 feet higher than the river, and nearly parallel with it, yet the geological horizons are almost the same as those on the river. The surface exposures, however, on the Sugar Creek do not show the strata to the same depth as those on the river front by about 75 feet.

We will now sketch the geology of this district, beginning with the top of the bluffs fronting the river:

2. Coal, divided as follows: Coal, 6 inches; black shales, 5 feet; coal, 4 feet. This coal is a clean, hard, black, lustrous mineral of beautiful physical characteristics. It breaks out into blocks, and its vertical joint planes are remarkably even. It is sufficiently hard to bear handling and transportation without injury. It is reported as burning with intense heat, and leaving but a small quantity of fine white ash.

These qualities would recommend it for domestic fuel and for a steam coal; but not for a gas coal nor a coking coal. This has been identified by Mr. W. W. Rainey as the same coal as the Reynoldsville coal of Pennsylvania.

This is a coal seam with a remarkably uniform structure, with a thin seam of slate one to two inches thick a little below the middle. It is not so hard as the coal mentioned above, but is said to be a good coal for domestic fuel. Not much can be said of its qualities until the chemical analysis is completed, when it can be compared with the others. The roof of this coal seemed to be good and no difficulty would be encountered in mining it.

This is a very celebrated coal of very wide distribution. It is the great coal seam of Preston county adjoining Barbour on the north. It is mined and coked at Austen, on the B. & O. R. R., and mined at the Kingwood tunnel by the Merchant's Coal Co., of Baltimore.

This coal is usually a complex seam, divided up into two or three benches by partings of slate or bony coal. It nearly always cokes well, and in many districts is known as the "coking vein." It will in the future gradually take the place of the Pittsburg coal, as the great coking coal. The best layers of this coal must be described as a tender coal, the large lumps breaking up with handling.

The above coals all dip toward the river, and so drain themselves of water and gases by gravity. This increases their safety, both from accumulations of water and from gas explosions.

I was not able to see this coal open on the lands of the company, but in the neighborhood of Philippi it has the following structure:

In a well record about a mile west of Philippi, it is marked as having a thickness of 7 feet. That probably includes a foot of black shale on top.
