My husband was indebted at the time of his death to the Plaintiff, Roy Gardner, in the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) on a single Bill, with interest from June 19, 1929, My husband was also indebted to various other persons in sundry sums of money.

It will be necessary, to sell all of the above described real estate in order to pay the debts owing by my said husband."

To the General Interrogatory by the Examiner; Answered, "Nothing further except that I am anxious to see the above mentioned real estate sold and disposed of in these proceedings."

Minnie M. Summers

Lewis Putman a witness of lawful age produced on the part of the Plaintiff being first duly sworn and examined viva voce deposed and says as follows:

"My name is Lewis Putman, I am 51 years of age and live near Frederick, Maryland, I know all the parties to this suit and also the property described in these proceedings.

Charles K. Summers died in November 1922 and left no will. He left a widow, Mrs. Minnie M. Summers, the preceding witness and three children, Ethel Summers, Dorothy Summers and Charles H. Summers, all of whom unmarried infants, as his only heirs-at-law.

The said real estate above described is worth about \$300.00 to \$350.00 Dollars for the first parcel and about One Hundred and Fifty Dollars for the second parcel. The personal estate of said Charles K. Summers is insufficient to pay all the debts due by him at the time of his death. He owes the Plaintiff, Roy Gardner, the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) on a single bill with interest from June 19, 1920, and the said Roy Gardner has proved his note against the estate of Charles K. Summers. All of the parties to this cause live in Frederick County, Maryland.

It will be necessary to sell all of the above described real estate in order to pay the debts owing by the said Charles K. Summers."

To the General Interrogatory of the Examiner the Witness Answered; Nothing further."

"My name is Spencer E. Stup, I am 48 years of age and live in Frederick County, Maryland I know all the parties to this suit and also the property described in these proceedings. I am not related to any of the parties to this case nor in any way interested in the estate of the late Charles K. Summers.

Charles K. Summers died in November, 1922, and left no will. He left a widow, Mrs. Minnie M. Summers, one of the witnesses in this case, and three children, Ethel Summers, Dorothy Summers and Charles H. Summers, all of whom unmarried infants, as his only heirs-at-law. The real estate above described is worth about Three Hundred to Three Hundred and Fifty (\$300.00) to (\$350.00) for the first parcel and about One Hundred and Fifty (\$150.00) for the second parcel.
