Q. Do the restaurant people occupy the basement floor of the corner building?

A. No.

Q. How deep is it from Maple Street back to---

RE-CROSS EXAMINATION BY MR. CLAGGETT

Q. Is the restaurant any wider than this room?

A. Yes, sir. It is about twice as wide.

Q. Down one side of the restaurant there is a counter, then tables and chairs and a pin ball machine, isn't that correct?

Q. How much room between the counter and the edge of the tables and booths?

A. About seven feet.

Q. The width of the counter, seven feet, and then the rows of tables?

A. I guess so.

Q. How many rows of tables?

A. About three.

Q. Then the restaurant is not over twenty or twenty-five feet deep?

A. I don't know.

Q. Just give your estimate?

A. I don't know.

RE-RE-DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. NEWMAN:

Q. There is a storeroom and kitchen?

A. Yes.

Q. The restaurant area includes all of the basement except the small room where Mr. Claggett has his office?

A. Yes, except the office of Mr. Claggett. The restaurant people can go all the way up to No. 6 West Potomac Street, but it is not heated.

Q. How many radiators are in the building?

A. There are three radiators in the storeroom. Stanley had two great big radiators in his place. The apartment on the same floor had one in each room. The apartment upstairs has one in each room and one in the bathroom. Fourth floor has four medium sized radiators. There is too much heat in a big house.

Q. How many radiators in No. 6?

A. Three, I think.

Q. How many in No. 8?

A. One in each room in the apartment.

Q. How many in No. 10?

A. There are two great big radiators in there.
