To the Honorable the Judges of the Circuit Court for Frederick County, sitting as a Court of Equity.

The Bill of Complaint of Flora V. Gonso Jackson and Charles Jackson, her husband, respectfully shows unto your honors:-

FIRST, That Henry Gonso the father of the said Flora V. Gonso Jackson and Ida M. Phleeger was, in his life time, seized and possessed of a part of a tract of land situate, lying and being in Braddock District, Frederick County, State of Maryland, containing eight acres and three fourths of land, and being the same real estate conveyed to the said Henry Gonso by deed of Frederick Krantz and Katherine E. Krantz, his wife, on date of October 9th in the year 1876 and duly recorded in Liber T. G. No. 5, Folio 277 one of the Land Records of Frederick County aforesaid as will appear by reference to a certified copy of said deed herewith filed and marked Exhibit "A" and which together with all other Exhibits hereinafter produced, it is prayed may be taken and considered as part of this Bill of Complaint.

SECOND, That the said Henry Gonso being so seized and possessed of said real estate, departed this life in the year 1915 and by his last will and testament duly admitted to probate by the Orphans' Court of Frederick County, and recorded in Liber S. D. T. No. 2, Folio 102, 103 one of the Records for Wills in the office of the Register of Wills for Frederick County did bequeath and devise as follows:

1st" I give, devise and bequeath my entire estate, real and personal, to my beloved wife Charlotte A. Gonso, for and during her natural life, and after her death the same is to go to my two daughters, Flora V. Gonso, and Mrs. Ida M. Phleeger, as joint tenants, with the right of survivorship." all of which will appear by reference to a certified copy of said will filed herewith and marked Exhibit " B."
