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bill he sent he put \$10 additional on for administering. Of course I never answered his --

Q Did he send the bill to you? A. Yes.

Q Is this the bill? A. That is the bill.

(Bill of M. J. Grohe, of Chillicothe, Ohio, directed to C. H. Feete and Brother, for James L. Withrow, dated October 10, 1940, for \$62.00, offered and filed in evidence).

(Bill of C. H. Feete and Brother for the sum of \$165.00 filed with the bill of complaint, offered and filed in evidence)

Q Have you attempted to collect your bill, and if so state the circumstances of your attempting to collect it?

A Well, when the young man came around and paid the \$20 he said "I'll pay you \$20 a month till I get this bill paid." So sometime after that he came around again. He said, "I am not going to pay any more on that property, because, he said, there's more heirs than myself and I am going to have it sold and let you get your money out of that," and I think he told me he was coming in to see you to see about selling the property, because he asked who would be a good lawyer and I happened to think of you (Mr. Rohrback) and I told him to see you. I am not sure he did it, but he left me under the impression he was coming in and get you to go ahead and close the place up. I don't know whether I am right on that or not.

Q Do you know whether Mr. Withrow, deceased, had any personal property and if he had any other creditors in Brunswick or anywhere else?

A No, sir, I don't have the remotest idea. I imagine he had personal property, because his wife was living a year or two before his death and they were living together and naturally must have had some personal property, although I don't know that to be a fact. It might have been the children's property.
