Will you look at that deed and state whether or not it correctly describes the property which was conveyed away by Mrs. Brashears' heirs to the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad Company.

A. Yes, sir.

(Certified copy of deed, marked Exhibit "No. 3" filed with Examiner as evidence.)

Q. I show you a certified copy of a deed from Theodore H. Brashears, Theodore H. Brashears, Jr., Bessie E. Hill and Henry Hill to Ambrose L. Brashears, dated March 3, 1908. Will you look at that deed and state whether or not it correctly describes the property which was conveyed by Mrs. Brashears' heirs to Ambrose L. Brashears.

A. Yes, it does.

(Certified copy of deed, marked Exhibit "No. 4" filed with Examiner as evidence.)

Q. When Amanda I. Brashears died, who were the persons she left surviving her as her heirs-at-law?

A. She was survived by her husband, Theodore H. Brashears. She also left surviving a daughter, Bessie Estella Hill, who I married. She was also survived by a son, Theodore H. Brashears, Jr., who is unmarried; and another son, Ambrose L. Brashears, who is a widower.

Q. When did Mrs. Hill die, that is, your wife?
