

Margaret B. Davis, a witness of law-ful age produced on the part of the complainants, and being duly sworn, deposes and says:

1. Please state your name, age and residence.

A. Margaret B. Davis, Aged 44 years and reside at Doubs, Maryland.

2. Are you related to any of the parties to this suit?

A. Yes Sir. I am a grand daughter of the Hiram Smith mentioned, and a daughter of Ella B. Whitter.

3. Is the paper now handed you marked "Exhibit A" a copy of the last will of your grandfather, Hiram Smith?

A. Yes Sir:

4. Who are the remaining heirs at law of your grand father, Hiram Smith?

A. Hiram Smith died about the year 1906 and left surviving him, the following children: Ella V. Whitter, Ada B. Corun, May Scarff and Vernon Smith: Vernon Smith died, intestate, in 1937, and left surviving him, four grand children, Vernon Hagen, Florence Hagen, Harvey Hagen and June Hagen, as his only heirs at law, the mother of said infant children, Irene Smith Hagen was the only child of Vernon Smith, and died before the death of said Vernon Smith.

Addie Corun, a daughter of said Hiram Smith, died, intestate in 1937, and left surviving her as her only heirs at law, her husband, George W. Corun, and no children, but her sister, Ella V. Whitter, May Scarff and the four infant children of Vernon Smith.

5. Did your ^{grand-}father own any real estate at the time of his death?

A. Yes. He owned a house and lot in Jefferson, Frederick County, Maryland, known as Lot No. 7, and described in the deed from John N. Merling and wife, filed in this cause and marked "Exhibit B".

6. Can this property be divided amongst the parties interested?
