TO THE HONORABLE, THE JUDGES OF SAID COURT:

The Petition of Charlotte Munshour respectfully represents unto your Honorable Court:

FIRST: That on the 21st day of February, 1929, your Petitioner together with her oldest son, filed a Bill of Complaint in your Honorable Court asking that Trustees be appointed to ^{sell} ~~ac-~~ said real estate of which her husband died seized and possessed.

SECOND: That on said Bill of Complaint testimony was taken and on the 10th day of April, 1929, your Honorable Court signed a Decree directing the sale of the real estate mentioned in said proceedings and appointed Frank L. Stoner and Lester S. Birely as trustees to sell the same.

THIRD: That after said Decree was signed, your Petitioner thought it advisable that said real estate and improvements thereon be retained as a home for herself and minor children and the trustees took no further action nor did they file any bond in these proceedings.

FOURTH: That your Petitioner intends to move from said property on the first day of April and desires that said property be sold. That the two trustees appointed by your Honorable Court are unable to serve, Mr. Frank L. Stoner is unable because of ill health, and Lester S. Birely is confined in a hospital in Baltimore and will remain there for over a month.

FIFTH: That Frank L. Stoner suggested the name of William M. Storm as the trustee or one of the trustees, and Lester S. Birely has recommended William Edgar Byrd, an attorney at law, to act in his place and stead; the recommendation of Lester S. Birely is filed herewith marked Exhibit No. 1 to this Petition.
