

and you won't get a first-class farmer to go on the place. I have tried everything I knew what to do. There's no fences there and the barn needs fixing for cows, you know, and there's things there have to be done to get a first-class farmer and I wouldn't have the money to fix up the farm in the condition it ought to be to get a first-class farmer, and I don't know what else to do, nothing else to be done.

Q How many farms are there altogether?

A Well there's these two good ones out here, and one at Mt. Pleasant, and they just merely pay expenses, and then one at Jefferson, it hardly pays expenses, because I didn't get anything but \$100 off of it last year, and then this year I rented it for money rent; and the New Market farm; three farms.

Q From the two good farms how much income do you get approximately?

A Well I can't tell you unless I would have my papers to show.

Q -- Give us a general idea.

A I don't suppose it was more than \$800 for the two places. I don't know whether it was that or not. I don't know whether it was that much or not. Of course I haven't sold my corn yet. I don't know what I am going to get for that. I still got last year's yellow corn crop.

Q (Mr. Storm) Out of that \$800 how much you have to pay?

A Taxes, insurance, fertilizers, and I had some work down around, had little things fixed that had to be done.

Q (The Court) The \$800 then wasn't net income?

A No, that was the money that was just taken in off the place.

Q (Mr. Storm) And you said in the early part of your testimony your taxes were six or seven hundred dollars?

A Yes, altogether.. I can't just tell you exactly, because I write it all down and can't keep it in my mind, but I have it all wrote down. I can show you all the figures and everything.

Q The statement you have down home, is that a true and correct statement of all your income from the farms?

A Yes, sir, for the year. I wrote it down on each farm, how it was on each house and each farm and all the money paid out for insurances, each
