Davis's part of the 'Resurvey on Solomon's Flower' and with said John F. Davis's part reversed North 54° West $56\frac{1}{2}$ perches to a stake, then South $38\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ West 88 perches to intersect the 3d line of a deed from Upton Worthington to Eli Davis aforesaid at the end of 2.3 perches reversed; then with said 3d line South $51\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ East 2.3 perches to the place of beginning, containing 61 acres, 3 roods and 15 square perches of land, more or less. Secondly, Also all that piece or parcel of land situate in the State and County aforesaid called 'Daniel's Small Tract' which was conveyed to Eli Davis by Upton Worthington and Catherine Worthington, his wife, by deed dated December 5, 1855, and recorded among the Land Records of Frederick County, containing 16 acres of land,
