

Q. Can you tell us the name of the book?

Q. This picture which is Exhibit #2, the picket fence is on the north side of the stones?

A. Yes.

Q. And Exhibit #1, these stones are north of the porch, are they not?

A. Yes. I think my grandfather went to authorities in order to put that porch on.

Q. That is what you think?

A. Yes, I understood he did, I don't know.

Q. You don't know what he did, do you?

A. Granted, Mr. Newman, I can only tell what has been handed down. We didn't keep a running account of that sort of thing.

MR. STORM: I have prepared a chain of title of the real estate of Grace R. B. Summers taking it back as far as 1816, the Will of Jacob Smith recorded in Liber HS #2, Folio 322, one of the Register of Wills records. I would like to introduce this as Exhibit #5 showing the way the property has changed hands since that time and indicating the Summers family has owned it since April 18, 1890 when they purchased it from Jacob Rohrback and Charles Ross, Trustees under the Will of Daniel Baugher.
