THIS DEED, made this 3 day of August, in the

year Nineteen Hundred and Seventy, by Edwin R. Freed And
Mary I. Freed, his wife of Locust Valley, County of Frederick, State of Maryland

WITNESSETH: That for and in consideration of the sum of Ten Dollars (\$10.00) and
other good and valuable considerations, the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, we,
the said Edwin R. Freed and Mary I. Freed

STATE PROPERTY TRANSFER

do hereby grant and convey all our right, title and interest, unto Liganore Corporation,
its successors and assigns, in and to all those pieces or parcels of land situate, lying
and being in Now Market District, Frederick County, Maryland, and more particularly
described in one general outline as follows:

Beginning at the end of the second line of a deed from Henry Wood to William Devan,
dated August 31, 1813, and recorded in Liber W.R. No. 45, folio 408, one of the Land
Records of Frederick County, said point being also at the end of the second line of a
deed from Lester E. Boleyn and wife to the grantees herein, dated June 24, 1944, and
recorded in Liber No. 442, folio 411, one of the Land Records of Frederick County, and
running thence by and with the third, fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh lines of the
deed from Henry Wood to William Devan as follows: North 31 $\frac{1}{2}$ ^o West 20 perches, North 31^o
East 32 perches, North 29 $\frac{1}{2}$ ^o West 14 perches, South 58^o West 38 perches, South 21^o East
60 perches to the beginning point in the deed from Henry Wood to William Devan aforesaid,
thence by and with the third line reversed of the deed from Lester E. Boleyn and wife to
the grantees herein, North 21-3/4^o East 14.6 perches to the place of beginning, containing
7 $\frac{1}{2}$ acres, more or less.

Being all and the same real estate conveyed unto John Covell by two deeds, one from
Joshua Covell and wife, dated April 19, 1860, and recorded in Liber B.G.F. No. 5, folio
500, one of the Land Records of Frederick County, conveying a tract containing 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ acres,
and the other from Daniel H. Routzahn, Collector, dated January 14, 1888, and recorded in
Liber W.I.P. No. 4, folio 686, one of the Land Records of Frederick County, conveying a
tract containing 3 acres, more or less.

Being all and the same real estate of which the said John Covell died seized and
possessed, intestate, about 1900, leaving surviving him as his heirs at law, a son,
John P. Covell, and three daughters, Louisa Null, Ellen Sheets and Annie Snyder; the said
John P. Covell having departed this life about 1929 leaving no widow or children surviving;
the said Louisa Null having departed this life about 1940, survived by the following
children: Mary Crampton, Grace Gilbert, Elsie Castle, Alta Cline, James Null, Jerome Null

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
