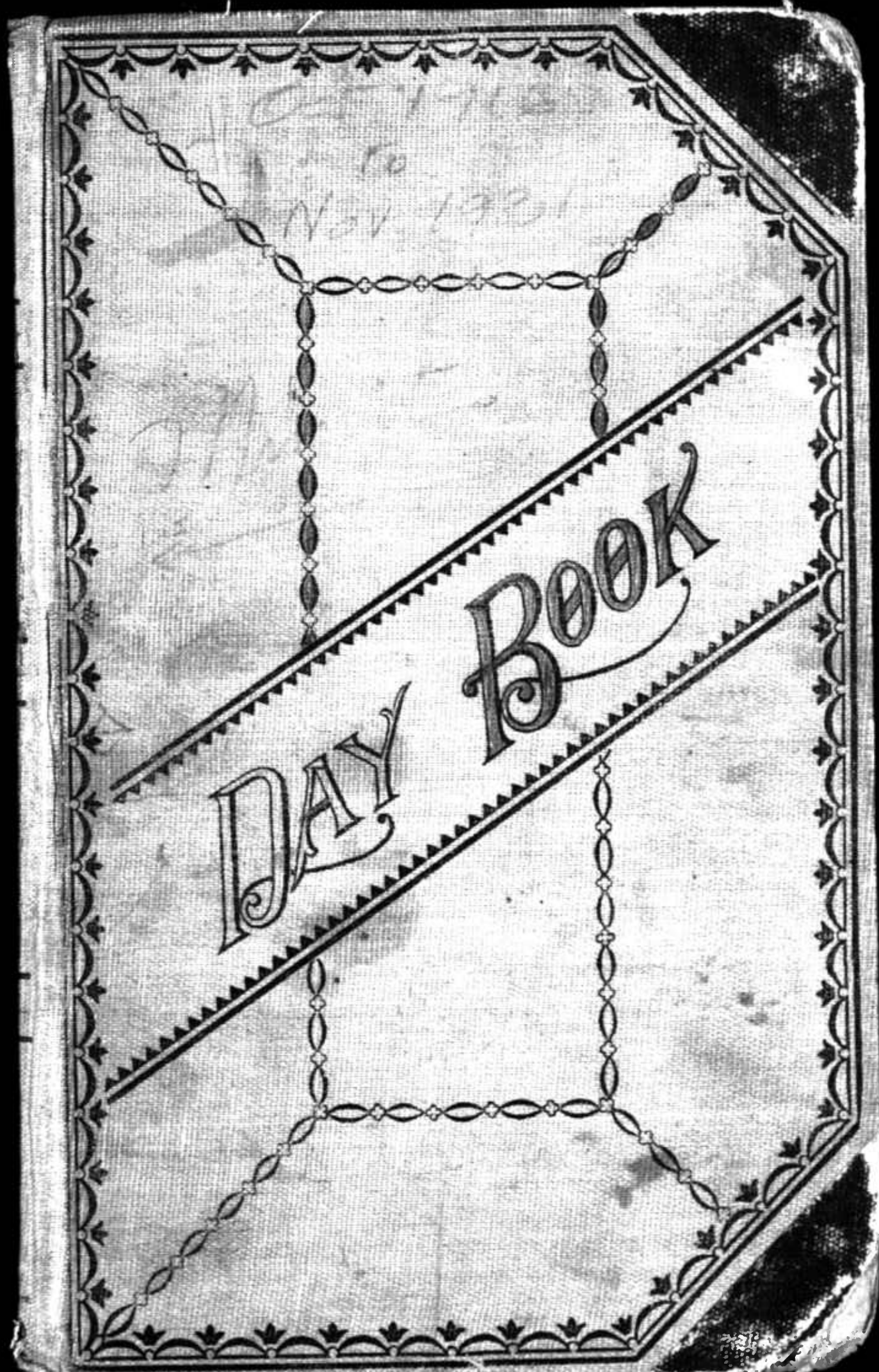

**HELP! In Case of Accidents.**

**Drowning.** 1. Loosen clothing, if any. 2. Empty lungs of water by laying body on its stomach and lifting by the middle so that the head hangs down. Jerk the body a few times. 3. Pull tongue forward, using handkerchief, or pin with string, if necessary. 4. Imitate motion of respiration by alternately compressing and expanding the lower ribs, about twenty times a minute. Alternately raising and lowering the arms from the sides up above the head will stimulate the action of the lungs. Let it be done gently but persistently. 5. Apply warmth and friction to extremities. 6. By holding tongue forward, closing the nostrils and pressing the "Adam's apple" back (so as to close entrance to stomach) direct inflation may be tried. Take a deep breath and breathe it forcibly into the mouth of patient, compress the chest to expel the air, and repeat the operation. 7. DON'T GIVE UP! People have been saved after HOURS of patient, vigorous effort. 8. When breathing begins get patient into a warm bed, give WARM drinks, or spirits in teaspoonfuls, fresh air and quiet.

**Burns and Scalds.** Cover with cooking soda and lay wet cloths over it. Whites of eggs and olive oil. Olive or linseed oil, plain or mixed with chalk or whiting.

**Lightning.** Dash cold water over a person struck.

**Sunstroke.** Loosen clothing. Get patient into shade and apply ice-cold water to head.

**Mad Dog or Snake Bite.** Tie cord tight above the wound. Suck the wound and cauterize with caustic or white-hot iron at once, or cut out adjoining parts with a sharp knife.

**Venomous Insects' Stings, etc.** Apply weak ammonia, oil, salt water or iodine.

**Fainting.** Place flat on back: allow fresh air and sprinkle with water.

**Electricity.** Release from current not touching body or wire with hands, metal or a wet stick. Handle body by its clothing, with rubber gloves and shoes if possible; if not, cover hands with dry woolen cloth and stand on dry boards. Then induce artificial respiration as in case of drowning. Rub limbs and massage body.

**ANTIDOTES FOR POISONS.**

**First.** Send for a Physician.

**Second.** INDUCE VOMITING, by tickling throat with feather or finger, drinking hot water or strong mustard and water. Swallow Sweet Oil or whites of Eggs.

Acids are antidotes for ALKALIES, and vice versa.

**DOMESTIC WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.**

**Apothecaries' Weight:** 20 grains=1 scruple; 3 scruples=1 dram; 8 drams=1 ounce; 12 ounces=1 pound.

**Avoirdupois Weight (short ton):** 27 11-32 grains=1 dram; 16 drams=1 ounce; 16 ounces=1 pound; 25 pounds=1 quarter; 4 quarters=1 cwt.; 20 cwt.=1 ton.

**Avoirdupois Weight (long ton):** 27 11-32 grains=1 dram; 16 drams=1 ounce; 16 ounces=1 pound; 112 pounds=1 cwt.; 20 cwt.=1 ton.

**Troy Weight:** 24 grains=1 pennyweight; 20 pennyweights=1 ounce; 12 ounces=1 pound.

**Circular Measure:** 60 seconds=1 minute; 60 minutes=1 degree; 60 degrees=1 sign; 12 signs=1 circle.

**Cubic Measure:** 1,728 cubic inches=1 cubic foot; 27 cubic feet=1 cubic yard.

**Dry Measure:** 2 pints=1 quart; 8 quarts=1 peck; 4 pecks=1 bushel.

**Liquid Measure:** 4 gills=1 pint; 2 pints=1 quart; 4 quarts=1 gallon; 3½ gallons=1 barrel; 2 barrels=1 hogshead.

**Long Measure:** 12 inches=1 foot; 3 feet=1 yard; 3½ yards=1 rod or pole; 40 rods=1 furlong; 8 furlongs=1 statute mile; 3 miles=1 league.

**Mariners' Measure:** 6 feet=1 fathom; 120 fathoms=1 cable length; 7½ cable lengths=1 mile; 5,280 feet=1 statute mile; 6,085 feet=1 nautical mile.

**Square Measure:** 144 square inches=1 square foot; 9 square feet=1 square yard; 30¼ square yards=1 square rod or perch; 40 square rods=1 rood; 4 roods=1 acre; 640 acres=1 square mile; 36 square miles (6 miles square)=1 township.

**Time Measure:** 60 seconds=1 minute; 60 minutes=1 hour; 24 hours=1 day; 7 days=1 week; 365 days=1 year; 366 days=1 leap year.

**BUSINESS LAW IN DAILY USE.**

The following compilation of business law contains the essence of a large amount of legal verbiage:

If a note is lost or stolen, it does not release the maker; he must pay it, if the consideration for which it was given and the amount can be proven.

Notes bear interest only when so stated.

Principals are responsible for the acts of their agents.

Each individual in a partnership is responsible for the whole amount of the debts of the firm, except in cases of special partnership.

Ignorance of the law excuses no one.

The law compels no one to do impossibilities.

An agreement without consideration is void.

A note made on Sunday is void.

Contracts made on Sundays cannot be enforced.

A note by a minor is void.

A contract made with a minor is void.

A contract made with a lunatic is void.

A note obtained by fraud, or from a person in a state of intoxication, cannot be collected.

It is a fraud to conceal a fraud.

Signatures made with a lead pencil are good in law.

A receipt for money is not always conclusive.

The acts of one partner bind all the rest.

"Value received" is usually written in a note, and should be, but is not necessary. If not written, it is presumed by the law, or may be supplied by proof.

The maker of an "accommodation" bill or note (one for which he has received no consideration, having lent his name or credit for the accommodation of the holder) is not bound to the person accommodated, but is bound to all other parties, precisely as if there was a good consideration.

No consideration is sufficient in law if it be illegal in its nature.

Checks or drafts must be presented for payment without unreasonable delay.

Checks or drafts should be presented during business hours, but in this country, except in the case of banks, the time extends through the day and evening.

If the drawee of a check or draft has changed his residence, the holder must take due or reasonable diligence to find him.

If one who holds a check as payee or otherwise transfers it to another, he has the right to insist that the check be presented that day, or, at the farthest, on the day following.

A note endorsed in blank (the name of the indorser only written) is transferable by delivery, the same as if made out to bearer.

If the time of payment of a note is not inserted, it is held payable on demand.

I am directed to acknowledge receipt of your communication of the 9th inst. respecting your desire to change the rates charged for electricity by your company, and to advise you that, in order to effect this increase in rates it will be necessary for the St. Michaels Utilities Commission to file with the Public Service Commission of Maryland a new schedule of rates, which schedule should contain all of the rates, rules and regulations of the St. Michaels Utilities Commission, which will be in effect on and after the date the rate change becomes operative. This schedule should be numbered in upper right-hand corner "P.S.C.Md. No. 2" and should cancel in its entirety schedule "P.S.C.Md. No. 1", which is the schedule in effect at the present time.

Under the rules of the Commission the schedule must be filed at least thirty days before the same can become effective and you should therefore show at the foot of schedule the date on which same is to become effective, which date must be not less than thirty days after the schedule is actually received by the Commission for filing.

I am further directed to send you, under separate cover, copy of this Commission's Circular No. 8A, which fully sets forth the requirements of the Commission respecting the construction and filing of these tariffs. If you use the present tariff as a guide with such changes in rates, etc, as are made necessary, you should have no difficulty in this connection.

Respecting power rates, would say that unless your company charges power users rates different from those charged lighting users, no separate power rates need, of course, be filed with the Commission.

Re: Unsatisfactory light conditions at residence of Mr. Lawrence Chaffinch at "Doncaster".

After thoroughly investigating this condition, I find the following:

That in all probability the voltage at this house is lower than formerly, but that this condition was not caused by changes made by you.

That at least some of the variations complained of are brought about by the transformer connections. Some time ago The St. Michaels Utilities Commission changed the transformers supplying their line at the Boro limits of Easton, replacing the three 25 Kva transformers with three 50 Kva transformers. The original transformers were equipped with 10% taps, making it possible to increase the ratio of transformation by this amount, and when they ordered the new transformers they ordered them equipped with 10% taps, but neglected to state that the transformers were to be used as "step up". The result was that they came with the taps on the 6600 volt side, which of course made it impossible to use these taps to increase the voltage as in the original. Consequently these new transformers lowered the voltage approximately 10%, and this reduction in voltage was reflected in the service investigated.

I have made two visits to Mr. Chaffinch's residence, one of which was on Saturday night, April 5th, at about 7:45 P. M., at which time the voltage across the three wires was as follows: 110-114.

It would seem from this that as far as this service is concerned the voltage is high enough, but there is quite a difference due to unbalance of the transformer windings.

The conditions are such that it is rather hard to balance this load, and I would recommend that this transformer be connected for 110 volt two wire service, which would eliminate the unbalanced condition, and probably reduce some of the more violent fluctuations in voltage caused by the starting of pumps and motors.

On both occasions when I visited this property the voltage seemed to be high enough for satisfactory lighting service on 110 volt lamps and devices, but if Mr. Chaffinch thinks he would like to have the excess voltage, the 10% taps in the step down transformer, at the Easton-Clairborne road can be used, raising the voltage at both his and other properties on this line.

I have discussed this with Mr. Fairbanks, of the St. Michaels Utilities Commission, and he states he will be glad to make these changes for you if you so desire.

The change to two wire service will require the changing of the meter in Mr. Chaffinch's house, but will not require any change of wiring. With these changes made, this property will at least have as much voltage as formerly, and the voltage regulation should be better than it is now, and certainly will be very much better than formerly.

Relative to your letter of Dec. 9/16, the copy of which you so kindly forwarded me the other day and which is in reference to the proposed high tension transmission line from Easton to St. Michaels.

I certainly agree with you that it would be very wise to eliminate any dangerous conditions on this line; also that the only practical solution is for the Telephone Co. to take one side of the road and the Electric Light Co. the other. In so far as this contemplated change I am entirely in sympathy with you, also am very anxious to cooperate with you in any way possible. At the same time, I wish to inquire if you think your proposition an entirely fair one. There is no doubt that several of the poles that you propose we should take over are not suitable to our requirements, also their height is different to the poles we should install. Our poles will be at the very least 25 ft. above ground where several of your poles are only 22 ft. above ground. Also no doubt you are aware that on the right side of the road which you propose to take there is a considerable amount of trimming to be done and in several cases very large trees will have to be removed. Especially is this the case on the first long woods approximately two miles from Easton.

I think that your company should bear half of the expense of this trimming, which in this particular instance is extraordinary.

Regarding the rights of way, inform you that we have procured the right to plant poles both from the County Commissioners and the State Road Commission, the latter Commission we had to give our check for the sum of \$25 per pole and enter into an agreement making this a yearly payment.

I shall be very pleased to hear from you further regarding this proposition so as to close this matter up at the earliest possible moment, as in all probability we shall commence work on this line not later than the middle of April.

In regard to the proposed High Tension transmission line from Easton to St. Michaels, we believe you agree to the fact that in order to avoid interference and eliminate any dangerous conditions, the Electric Light Line should occupy one side of the road and the Telephone Company the other. This plan, will obviate 16 high tension crossings, which cost approximately \$100.00 each.

Upon inspection, we find that the telephone line occupies the right side of road for the greater distance; crossing over to the left side at eight places, shown on attached map at points, A, B, C, D, E, F, G and H.

We would submit the following proposition:

The Electric Company, obtain the necessary right of way and construct a line, Class B Chestnut poles, on the right hand side of the road, opposite the points where our line is on the left side, the same number and height poles; also trim as may be necessary. This line to be transferred to the Telephone Company, who will transfer the existing poles on the left side to the Electric Co. The necessary anchors and guys to be included. — Our line was inspected and bad poles replaced one year ago, and we believe it is in good condition, but should any defective poles be found in sections which we propose to transfer to the Electric Co., we shall be glad to replace same at our expense. We will give assistance, if necessary, in securing the rights of way; stake the line on the right side of road; furnish an inspector for this construction work; and transfer our equipment from the left to new poles on the right hand side of road, at our expense. Also, should we desire the new poles slightly higher than the old poles, we will pay the additional cost.

There are approximately 172 line poles involved in this plan, which covers the line from pole #54 to #448 at the entrance of St. Michaels.

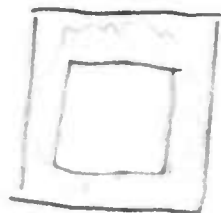

Notice of discontinuance of service should not be given to employees of the Commission away from the office as such notice will not be accepted as a binding and formal notification to the Commission.

15. Electrical Current shall be furnished the town of St. Michaels for lighting the streets thereof, at nine cents per K. W. H., provided, however, that the minimum amount paid by said town shall be one hundred dollars (\$100) per month.

16. Should persons located outside the Corporate limits of St. Michaels desire to be served with Electric Current for lighting purpose, application shall be made as provided for in these rules for citizens of St. Michaels. But should the house to be supplied be more than forty feet from the mainline, the applicant may construct a line as per specifications furnished by said Commission commencing forty feet from the main line to his building or he shall deposit with this Commission an amount sufficient to construct such line; provided that should another applicant desire to use the whole or a part of the line so constructed he shall pay to the commission his proportional part of the original cost of construction, and the sum so paid shall be returned to the original builder or builders of any line, so that each person using said line or lines shall pay proportionally for the use thereof. 

**STOCKINGLESS FAD HITS**

The bare legs vogue has depressed the operations of stocking mills and scores of operatives have been laid off in consequence of the lack of work. Manufacturers of dress materials likewise complain that short skirts have almost put them out of business while the small amount of material used in making milady's shoes has given the leather industry a black eye. With the shrinkage of dresses and the persistence of the stockingless fad there is cause for apprehension lest the manufacturers of women's attire may be forced out of business entirely within the next decade.

The mandates of fashion have set its face against stockings for misses and mesdames, but perhaps the summer will be half gone before the dear public will ascertain that the angles and curves are not encased in the deceptive flesh hued silk, but au naturel.

**REAPPORTIONMENT BILL IS PASSED BY SENATE**

Provisions for the taking of decennial censuses and for the automatic reapportionment of the House of Representatives are made in a bill recently passed by the Senate. The bill directs the President to report the census count to the Congress one year after the enumeration, which would be at the opening of Congress. Accompanying this report would be two statements showing the reapportionment of Representatives, one indicating the reapportionment if the system of major fraction were employed in making it, the other as it would be if the system of equal proportions were used. If the Congress fails to enact a law for the reapportionment in the short session when the report is received, the bill automatically gives each State in the Congress the reappor-

on thousands of American farms.

Electricity from the electric plant sensitizes the magnet which picks up bits of metal from the road as the truck speeds along. Every few miles the truck is stopped and the electric plant is shut off. The metal held by the magnet is immediately released and falls to the highway on a sheet of canvas where it is picked up and is forevermore off the road. During a distance of 21 miles, the magnet recently picked up 351 pounds of nails, spikes, wire, broken springs, bolts and similar puncture-making metals.

Thus with the aid of a magnet and the same sort of electric plant familiar to all farmers, this modern "road cleaner" is removing the menaces to tires which have always threatened the peace and happiness of the motorist.

**The Penny Still an Important Factor in the Average Household**

The penny is still an important buying factor in the average household, even though attention may have been distracted from it to the currency of larger denominations in recent years. It will still buy a box of matches, a cake of chewing gum, a stamp and innumerable other articles of merchandise.

One penny will also pay for a lot of work around the city or country home, as some recent statistics reveal.

A cent's worth of fuel for the individual electric plant, for instance, will generate 200 watts of electric energy. That amount of electricity will do the following tasks:

Pump 600 gallons of water in a 50 foot lift; light one 20 watt lamp for 10 hours or five such lamps for two hours; run a nine-inch electric fan for five hours; operate an electric washing machine for one hour; heat an electric iron for 33 minutes, or run an electric sewing machine for two hours.

In terms of such work as this, the penny still has its place in the family budget. Paper money will shrink in size this month when the U. S. treasury issues new bills of smaller proportions, but the penny will still be with us unchanged in size or buying power.

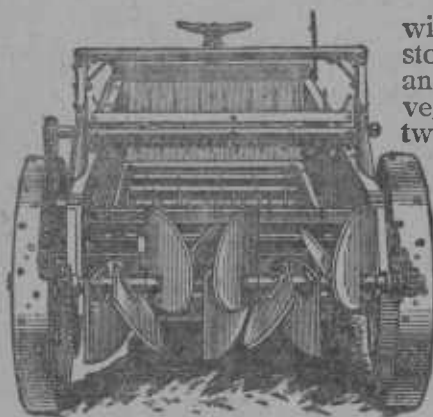

We are being very much pressed by our consumers, to lower our rates for electric current. This agitation is brought about by the published reports of your prosperous year (1924), and by the fact that your rates have materially decreased.

We are aware of the terms of the contract between your commission and ours, also that there are yet two years for this contract to run.

We purchased from you during 1924, 120940 K.W.H. of current for \$ 6989.06, averaging us at your station about \$ .058 per K.W.H. Our loss in delivering this current is 42% which brings our cost per K.W.H. at the consumer's meter to rather a high figure.

Because of these facts we are asking for a lower rate, as low, as in justice to your commission you can give us. You will realize that we can do no better by our consumers, without this sort of help from your commission.

We have no desire to terminate our present contract, which should be allowed to stand in case conditions should necessitate returning to its present terms.

We hope you can see that our request is reasonable and if so, will put the reduction in effect, beginning March, first.

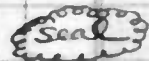



As you know during the past few years we have been experiencing from time to time noise on our Easton-St. Michaels toll circuits in excess of that to which we generally work for rendering satisfactory commercial service. To remedy this rather undesirable situation, the telephone circuits were retransposed to care for certain discontinuities in the exposure to your 6600 volt line from Easton to St. Michaels which originally paralleled our line the entire distance.

Since noise measurements indicated that the retransposition of our circuits was not in itself sufficient to reduce the noise to a satisfactory value, the matter of installing transpositions in your line was discussed with Mr. Fairbanks and on December 5th and 6th three transpositions were placed opposite telephone poles #84, 163 and 298.

I wish to take this opportunity to express our appreciation for the cooperation of your Company in this matter and the prompt manner in which the work was accomplished under Mr. Fairbank's supervision.

POSTAL INFORMATION.

Revised December, 1908, at the New York Post Office.

DOMESTIC RATES OF POSTAGE.

ALL mailable matter for transmission by the United States mails within the United States, is divided into four classes under the following regulations. (Domestic rates apply to Canada, Mexico, Cuba, Tutuila, Porto Rico, Guam, Hawaii, the Philippines, the "Canal Zone," the Republic of Panama, and Shanghai, China.)

**FIRST-CLASS MATTER.**—This class includes letters, postal cards, "post cards," and anything sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, or anything containing writing not allowed as an accompaniment to printed matter under class three.

Rates of letter postage to any part of the United States, its possessions, or the above-named countries, *two cents per ounce or fraction thereof.*

Rates on local or drop letters at free delivery offices, two cents per ounce or fraction thereof. At offices where there is no free delivery by carriers, and the addressee cannot be served by rural free delivery carriers, one cent per ounce or fraction thereof.

Rates on **POSTAL-CARDS**, one cent (double or "reply" cards, two cents). Postal cards issued by the Post Office Department may bear written, printed, or other additions as follows:

(a) The face of the card may be divided by a vertical line placed approximately one-third of the distance from the left end of the card; the space to the left of the line to be used for a message, etc., but the space to the right for the address only.

(b) Addresses upon postal cards may be either written, printed, or affixed thereto, at the option of the sender.

(c) Very thin sheets of paper may be attached to the card on condition that they completely adhere thereto. Such sheets may bear both writing and printing.

(d) Advertisements, illustrations, or writing may appear on the back of the card and on the left third of the face.

2. The addition to a postal card of matter other than as above authorized will subject the card, when sent in the mails, to postage according to the character of the message—at the letter rate if wholly or partly in writing or the third-class rate if entirely in print. In either case the postage value of the stamp impressed upon the card will not be impaired.

3. Postal cards must be treated in all respects as sealed letters, except that when undeliverable to the addressee they may not be returned to the sender.

4. Postal cards bearing particles of glass, metal, mica, sand, tinsel or other similar substances, are unmailable, except when inclosed in envelopes with proper postage attached, or when treated in such manner as will prevent the objectionable substances from being rubbed off or injuring persons handling the mails.

Cards that have been spoiled in printing or otherwise, will be redeemed from the original purchasers at 75 per cent. of their face value if un mutilated.

**POST CARDS.**—(Private Mailing Cards)—bearing written or printed messages are transmissible in the mails. Private mailing cards ("post cards") in the domestic mails must conform to the following conditions:

(a) A post card must be an unfolded piece of cardboard not exceeding approximately 3½ by 5½ inches, nor less than approximately 2½ by 4 inches.

(b) It must in form and in the quality and weight of paper be substantially like the Government postal card.

(c) It may be of any color not interfering with a legible address and postmark.

(d) It may or may not, at the option of the sender, bear near the top of the face the words "post card."

(e) The face of the card may be divided by a vertical line; the left half to be used for a message, etc., but that to the right for the address only.

(f) Very thin sheets of paper may be attached to the card, and then only on condition that they completely adhere thereto. Such sheets may bear both writing and printing.

(g) Advertisements and illustrations may appear on the back of the card and on the left half of the face.

2. Cards, without cover, conforming to the foregoing conditions are transmissible in the domestic mails (including the possessions of the United States) and to Cuba, Canada, Mexico, the Republic of Panama, and the United States postal agency at Shanghai, China, at the postage rate of one cent each.

3. When post cards are prepared by printers and stationers for sale, it is desirable that they bear in the upper right hand corner of the face an oblong diagram containing the words, "Place postage stamp here," and at the bottom of the space to the right of the vertical dividing line, the words, "This space for the address."

4. Cards which do not conform to the conditions prescribed by these regulations are, when sent in the mails, chargeable with postage according to the character of the message—at the letter rate, if wholly or partly in writing, or at the third-class rate, if entirely in print.

5. Cards bearing particles of glass, metal, mica, sand, tinsel, or other similar substances, are unmailable, except when inclosed in envelopes, or when treated in such manner as will prevent the objectionable substances from being rubbed off or injuring persons handling the mails.

Rates on special delivery letters, ten cents on each letter in addition to the regular postage. This entitles the letter to immediate delivery by special messenger. Special delivery stamps are sold at post-offices, and must be affixed to such letters. An ordinary ten-cent stamp affixed to a letter will entitle it to special delivery if the letter is marked, "Special Delivery."

The delivery, at carrier offices, extends to the limits of the carrier routes. At non-carrier offices it extends to one mile from the post-office. Postmasters are not obliged to deliver beyond these limits, and letters addressed to places beyond must await delivery in the usual way, notwithstanding the special delivery stamp.

Prepayment by stamps invariably required. Postage on all letters should be fully prepaid, but if prepaid one full rate and no more, they will be forwarded, and the amount of deficient postage collected on delivery; if wholly unpaid, or prepaid with less than one full rate and deposited at a post-office, the addressee will be noti-

fied to remit postage; and if he fails to do so, they will be sent to the Dead Letter Office; but they will be returned to the sender if he is located at the place of mailing, and if his address be printed or written upon them.

Letter rate is charged on all productions by the typewriter or manifold process, and on all oriented imitations of typewriting or manuscript, unless such reproductions are presented at post-office windows in the minimum number of twenty identical copies separately addressed.

Letters and other matter prepaid at the letter rate—two cents an ounce or fraction thereof—(but no other class of mail matter) will be returned to the sender free, if a request to that effect is printed or written on the envelope or wrapper. The limit of weight is four pounds, except for a single book.

Prepaid letters will be forwarded from one post-office to another upon the written request of the person addressed, without additional charge for postage. The direction on forwarded letters may be changed as many times as may be necessary to reach the person addressed.

**SECOND-CLASS MATTER.**—This class includes all newspapers and periodicals exclusively in print that have been "Entered as second-class matter," and are regularly issued at stated intervals as frequently as four times a year, from a known office of publication and mailed by the publishers or news agents to actual subscribers or to news agents for sale, and newspapers and publications of this class mailed by persons other than publishers. Also periodical publications of benevolent and fraternal societies, organized under the lodge system and having a membership of a thousand persons, and the publications of strictly professional, literary, historical, and scientific societies, and incorporated institutions of learning, trade unions, etc., provided only that these be published at stated intervals not less than four times a year, and that they be printed on and be bound in paper. Publishers who wish to avail themselves of the privileges of the act are required to make formal application to the department through the postmaster at the place of publication, producing satisfactory evidence that the organizations, societies and institutions represented come within the purview of the law, and that the object of the publications is to further the objects and purposes of the organization.

Rates of postage to publishers, *one cent a pound or fractional part thereof*, prepaid in currency. Publications designed primarily for advertising or free circulation, or not having a legitimate list of subscribers, are excluded from the pound rate, and pay the third-class rate.

Publications sent to actual subscribers in the county where published are free, unless mailed for delivery at a letter-carrier office.

Rates of postage on second-class newspapers, magazines, or periodicals, mailed by others than the publishers or news agents, *one cent for each four ounces or fraction thereof*. It should be observed that the rate is one cent for each four ounces, not one cent for each paper contained in the same wrapper. This rate applies only when a complete copy is mailed. Parts of second-class publications or partial or incomplete copies are *third-class matter*. Second-class matter will be entitled to special delivery when special delivery stamps (or ten cents in ordinary stamps and the words, "Special Delivery" placed on the wrapper) are affixed in addition to the regular postage.

Second-class matter must be so wrapped as to enable the postmaster to inspect it. The sender's name and address may be written in them or on the wrapper, also the words "sample copy," or "marked copy." Typographical errors in the text may be corrected, but any other writing subjects the matter to letter postage.

**THIRD-CLASS MATTER.**—Mail matter of the third class includes printed books, pamphlets, engravings, circulars in print (or by the hectograph, electric-pen, or similar process when at least twenty identical copies, separately addressed, are mailed at post-office windows at one time), and other matter wholly in print, proof sheets, corrected proof sheets, and manuscript copy accompanying the same.

The rate on matter of this class is *one cent for each two ounces or fraction thereof* payable by stamps affixed, unless 2,000 or more identical pieces are mailed under special permit when the postage at that rate may be paid in money.

Manuscript unaccompanied by proof-sheets must pay letter rates.

Third-class matter must admit of easy inspection, otherwise it will be charged letter rates on delivery. It must be fully prepaid, or it will not be despatched. New postage must be prepaid for forwarding to a new address or returning to senders.

The limit of weight is four pounds, except single books, in separate packages, on which the weight is not limited. It is entitled like matter of the other classes, to special delivery when special delivery stamps are affixed in addition to the regular postage, or when ten cents in ordinary stamps are affixed in addition to the regular postage and the words, "Special Delivery" are placed on the wrapper.

**FOURTH-CLASS MATTER.**—Fourth-class matter is allailable matter not included in the three preceding classes which is so prepared for mailing as to be easily withdrawn from the wrapper and examined. It embraces merchandise and samples of every description, and coin or specie.

Rate of postage, *one cent for each ounce or fraction thereof* (except seeds, roots, bulbs, cuttings, scions, and plants, the rate on which is *one cent for each two ounces or fraction thereof*). This matter must be fully prepaid, or it will not be despatched. Postage must be paid by stamps affixed, unless 2,000 or more identical pieces are mailed at one time when the postage at that rate may be paid in money. New postage must be prepaid for forwarding or returning. The affixing of special delivery ten-cent stamps in addition to the regular postage entitles fourth-class matter to special delivery. (See remarks under "first-class matter.")

**THIRD OR FOURTH CLASS MATTER MAILABLE WITHOUT STAMPS.**—Under special permits postage may be paid in money for third or fourth class matter mailed in quantities of 2,000 or more identical pieces. For information concerning the regulations governing such mailings inquiry should be made of the postmaster.

**REGISTRATION.**—All kinds of postal matter may be registered at the rate of *eight cents for each package* in addition to the regular rates of postage, to be fully prepaid in stamps. Each package must bear the name and address of the sender, and a receipt will be returned from the person to whom addressed. Mail matter can be registered at all post-offices in the United States.

An indemnity—not to exceed \$25 for any one registered piece, or the actual value of the piece, if it is less than \$25—shall be paid for the loss of first-class registered matter mailed at and addressed to a United States post-office.

**DOMESTIC MONEY ORDERS.**—Domestic money orders are issued by money-order post-offices for any amount up to \$100, at the following rates:

For sums not exceeding \$2.50, 3 cents; over \$2.50 to \$5, 5 cents; over \$5 to \$10, 8 cents; over \$10 to \$20, 10 cents; over \$20 to \$30, 12 cents; over \$30 to \$40, 15 cents; over \$40 to \$50, 18 cents; over \$50 to \$60, 20 cents; over \$60 to \$75, 25 cents; over \$75 to \$100, 30 cents.

**STAMPED ENVELOPES.**—Embossed stamped envelopes and newspaper wrappers of several denominations, sizes, and colors are kept on sale at post-offices, singly or in quantities, at a small advance on the postage rate. Stamps cut from stamped envelopes are valueless; but postmasters are authorized to give good stamps for stamped envelopes or newspaper wrappers that may be spoiled in directing, if presented in a substantially whole condition.

**FEES FOR DOMESTIC MONEY ORDERS.**—Payable in the United States (which includes Hawaii and Porto Rico) and its possessions comprising the Canal Zone (Isthmus of Panama), Guam, the Philippines and Tutuila, Samoa; also for Orders payable in British Guiana, British Honduras, Canada, Cuba, Newfoundland, the United States Postal Agency at Shanghai (China), the Bahama Islands, and certain other Islands in the West Indies, mentioned in Register of Money Order Post Offices.

For Orders from \$0.01 to \$2.50, 3 cents; from \$2.51 to \$5.00, 5 cents; from \$5.01 to \$10.00, 8 cents; from \$10.01 to \$20.00, 10 cents; from \$20.01 to \$30.00, 12 cents; from \$30.01 to \$40.00, 15 cents; from \$40.01 to \$50.00, 18 cents; from \$50.01 to \$60.00, 20 cents; from \$60.01 to \$75.00, 25 cents; from \$75.01 to \$100.00, 30 cents.

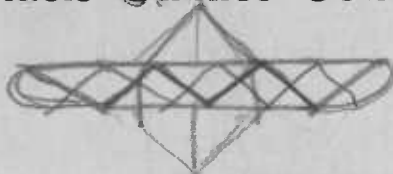
