IN our last GAZETTE, we gave our Readers the Two fifty, and Eleven last, of the Resolves of the Honourable House of Commons, of the 7th of February past, relating to a STAMP DUTY, in the Colonies, at full Length; but the other Forty-two were, for want of Room, abridg'd. The following are those Forty-two; but to save Room, and avoid many Repetitions, the Reader is desired, where he sees this Mark [R] to suppose or substitute the following Words, [RESOLVED, THAT A STAMP DUTY OF] Where he meets with this Mark [R] to suppose or substitute these Words, [STERLING MONEY, BE CHARGED UPON EVERY SKIN OR PIECE OF VELLUM OR PARCHMENT, OR SHEET OR PIECE OF PAPER, ON WHICH SHALL BE INGROSSED, WRITTEN OR PRINTED.] And where he finds this [R] to Read [WITHIN THE SAID COLONIES AND PLANTATIONS.]

RESOLVED, That a Stamp Duty of 1 s. 6 d. Sterling Money, be charged upon every Skin or Piece of Vellum or Parchment, or Sheet or Piece of Paper, on which shall be ingrossed, written or printed, any Petition, Bill, Answer, Claim, Plea, Replication, Rejoinder, Demurrer, or other Pleading, in any Court of Chancery, or Equity, within the said Colonies and Plantations.

§ 3 d. R. any Copy of any Petition, Bill, Answer, Claim, Plea, Replication, Rejoinder, Demurrer, or other Pleading, in any such Court.

§ 1 s. R. any Monition, Libel, Answer, Allegation, Inventory, or Renunciation in Ecclesiastical Matters, in any Court of Probate, Court of Ordinary, or other Court, exercising Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction.

§ 6 d. R. any Copy of any Will, other than the Probate thereof, Monition, Libel, Answer, Allegation, Inventory, or Renunciation in Ecclesiastical Matters, in any such Court.

§ 2 l. R. any Donation, Presentation, Collation, or Institution, of or to any Benefice, or any Writ or Instrument for the like Purpose, or any Register, Entry, Testimonial, or Certificate, of any Degree taken in any University, Academy, College, or Seminary of Learning.

§ 1 s. R. any Monition, Libel, Claim, Answer, Allegation, Information, Letter of Request, Execution, Renunciation, Inventory, or other Pleading, in any Admiralty Court.

§ 6 d. Sterling Money, be charged upon every Skin or Piece of Vellum or Parchment, or Sheet or Piece of Paper, on which any Copy of any such Monition, Libel, Claim, Answer, Allegation, Information, Letter of Request, Execution, Renunciation, Inventory, or other Pleading, shall be ingrossed, written or printed.

§ 10 s. R. any Appeal, Writ of Error, Writ of Dower, *ad quod damnum*, *certiorari*, Statute Merchant, Statute Staple, Attestation, or Certificate by any Officer, or Exemplification of any Record or Proceeding, in any Court whatsoever, within the said Colonies and Plantations, except Appeals, Writs of Error, *certiorari*, Attestations, Certificates, and Exemplifications, for or relating to the Removal of any Proceedings from before a single Justice of the Peace.

§ 5 s. R. any Writ of Covenants for levying of Fines, Writ of Entry for suffering a common Recovery, or Attachment, issuing out of, or returnable into, any Court.

§ 4 s. R. any Judgment, Decree, Sentence, or Dismission, or any Record of *nisi prius*, or *postea*, in any Court.

§ 1 s. R. any Affidavit, common Bail or Appearance, Interrogatory, Deposition, Rule, Order, or Warrant, of any Court, or any *decimus potestatem*, *rapies*, *subpoena*, Summons, compulsory Citation, Commission, Recognizance, or any other Writ, Process, or Mandate, issuing out of, or returnable into, any Court, or any Office belonging thereto, or any other Proceeding therein whatsoever, or any Copy thereof, or of any Record not before mentioned to be charged within the said Colonies and Plantations, except Warrants relating to criminal Matters, and Proceedings thereon, or relating thereto.

§ 10 l. R. any Licence, Appointment, or

Admission of any Counsellor, Solicitor, Attorney, Advocate, or Proctor, to practise in any Court, or of any Notary.

§ 4 d. R. any Note, or Bill of Lading, which shall be signed for any Kind of Goods, Wares or Merchandize, to be exported from, or any Cocket or Clearance granted.

§ 20 s. R. Letters of Mart, or Commission for private Ships of War.

§ 10 s. R. any Grant, Appointment, or Admission, of or to any public Beneficial Office or Employment, for the Space of one Year, or any lesser Time, of or above the Value of 20 l. per Annum, Sterling Money, in Salary, Fees, and Perquisites, except Commissions of Officers of the Army, Navy, Ordnance, or Militia, and of Justices of the Peace.

§ 6 l. Sterling Money, be charged upon every Skin or Piece of Vellum or Parchment, or Sheet or Piece of Paper, on which any Grant of any Liberty, Privilege, or Franchise, under the Seal of any of the said Colonies or Plantations, or under the Seal or Sign Manual of any Governor, Proprietor, or public Officer, alone, or in Conjunction with any other Person or Persons, or with any Council, or any Council and Assembly, or any Exemplification of the same, shall be ingrossed, written or printed.

§ 20 s. R. any Licence for retailing of spirituous Liquors, to be granted to any Person who shall take out the same.

§ 4 l. R. any Licence for retailing of Wine, to be granted to any Person who shall not take out a Licence for retailing of spirituous Liquors.

§ 3 l. R. any Licence for retailing of Wine, to be granted to any Person who shall take out a Licence for retailing of spirituous Liquors.

§ 5 l. R. any Probate of Will, Letters of Administration or of Guardianship for any Estate above the Value of 20 l. of the same Money within the British Colonies and Plantations upon the Continent of America, the Islands belonging thereto, and the Bermuda and Bahama Islands, except Probates of Wills, and Letters of Administration to the Effects of common Seamen or Soldiers, who shall die in the public Service.

§ 10 s. R. any such Probate, Letters of Administration, or of Guardianship, within all other Parts of the British Dominions in America.

§ 6 d. R. any Bond, for securing the Payment of any Sum of Money, not exceeding the Sum of 10 l. of the same Money, within the British Colonies and Plantations upon the Continent of America, the Islands belonging thereto, and the Bermuda and Bahama Islands.

§ 1 s. R. any Bond for securing the Payment of any Sum of Money above 10 l. and not exceeding the Sum of 20 l. of the same Money, within such Colonies, Plantations, and Islands.

§ 1 s. 6 d. R. any Bond for securing the Payment of any Sum of Money above 20 l. and not exceeding 40 l. of the same Money, within such Colonies, Plantations, and Islands.

§ 6 d. R. any Order or Warrant for surveying or setting out any Quantity of Land, not exceeding 100 Acres, issued by any Governor, Proprietor, or any public Officer, alone, or in Conjunction with any other Person or Persons, or with any Council, or any Council and Assembly, within the British Colonies and Plantations in America.

R. any such original Grant, or any such Deed, Meise Conveyance, or other Instrument whatsoever, whereby any Quantity of Land above 200, and not exceeding 320 Acres, shall be granted, conveyed or assigned, and in Proportion for every such Grant, Deed, Meise Conveyance, or other Instrument, granting, conveying or assigning every other 320 Acres, within the same Parts of the said Dominions.

§ 4 l. R. any Grant, Appointment or Admission, of or to any public Beneficial Office or Employment, not before mentioned to be charged, above the Value of 20 l. per Annum Sterling Money, in Salary, Fees and Perquisites, or any Exemplification of the same, within the British Colonies and Plantations upon the Continent of America, the Islands belonging thereto, and the Bermuda and Bahama Islands, except Commissions of Officers of the Army, Navy, Ordnance, or Militia, and of Justices of the Peace.

§ 6 l. R. any such Grant, Appointment, or Admission, of or to any such public Beneficial Office or Employment, or any Exemplification of the same, within all other Parts of the British Dominions in America.

§ 2 s. 6 d. R. any Indenture, Lease, Conveyance, Contract, Stipulation, Bill of Sale, Charter-party, Protest, Articles of Apprenticeship, or Covenant (except for the Hire of Servants not Apprentices; and also except such other Masters as are before mentioned to be charged) within the British Colonies and Plantations in America.

§ 5 s. Sterling Money, be charged upon every Skin or Piece of Vellum or Parchment, or Sheet or Piece of Paper, on which any Warrant or Order for auditing any public Accounts, beneficial Warrant, Order, Grant or Certificate, under any public Seal, or under the Seal or Sign Manual of any Governor, Proprietor, or public Officer, alone, or in Conjunction with any other Person, or Persons, or with any Council, or any Council and Assembly, not before mentioned to be charged, or any Passport, or Let-pais, Surrender of Office, or Policy of Assurance, shall be ingrossed, written or printed, except Warrants or Orders for the Service of the Navy, Army, Ordnance, or Militia, and Grants of Offices under 20 l. per Annum, in Salary, Fees and Perquisites.

§ 2 s. 3 d. R. any notarial Act, Bond, Deed, Letter of Attorney, Procurator, Mortgage, Release, or other obligatory Instruments, not before mentioned, to be charged.

§ 3 d. R. any Register, Entry, or Inrollment, of any Grant, Deed or other Instrument whatsoever, beforementioned, to be charged.

§ 2 s. R. any Register, Entry, or Inrollment, of any Grant, Deed, or other Instrument whatsoever, not beforementioned, to be charged.

§ 1 s. Sterling Money, be charged upon every Pack of playing Cards, which shall be sold or used.

§ 10 s. Sterling Money, be charged upon every Pair of Dice, which shall be sold or used.

THE Exigencies of the Kingdom are at present so pressing, with regard to the national Debt, that there is an absolute Necessity for making the People of our Colonies bear a reasonable Part of the Weight; but before we think of Loading them with any Portion, 'tis absolutely necessary that we should furnish them with Means. We must take off every Restriction which has been laid upon their Commerce; we must grant them an open, uninterrupted Trade; and, instead of treating them as Rivals or Enemies in Traffic, encourage them as Brothers and Friends; to enable them to bear a proportionable Share in our Distresses, we must invest them with a proportionable Share of our Advantages; and instead of looking on them with the jealous Eye of a Step mother, consider them as a valuable and immediate Part of ourselves.

From what has been said, it therefore appears incontestibly evident, that there is the strongest Necessity to mitigate the present Severity of the Mother Country, by making the Colonies, who have so largely shared in her Prosperity, bear some little Participation of her Distress. The Establishment of these Colonies have cost us Millions of Money and Rivers of Blood; 'tis surely Time then that we endeavour to make them of some little Account; 'tis surely Time for us to resign a System which has proved so detrimental to them as well as destructive to ourselves. How widely different from ours is the Behaviour of the other European Nations in regard to their Colonies! The Dutch wisely judge that a Subject, whether he lives in Amboyna or resides in Zeland, is equally a Subject, and of Consequence equally entitled to partake of the Benefits, or share in the Difficulties of the Mother Country. Hence the Dutch Colonies, by being considered as an immediate Part of the Republic, instead of being merely a nominal Advantage and real Burthen like ours, are made in a most material Degree important to the general Interest, and finally, if any Thing, more than their regular Portion, to the Exigencies of the Public. Portugal, 'tis well known, derives the principal Part of it's Opulence from her Colonies; so does Spain. Why in the Name of Wonder then cannot we imitate the Policy of those Nations, who by the Superiority of our Commerce, having infinitely greater Opportunities; and make our Settlements answer the great End of Colonization, the Benefit of the Settlers, and the Happiness of the Mother Country.

At present we seem solicitous to defeat the very Intention of establishing those Colonies, for the Possession of which we have been so incredibly prodigal, both of our Treasure and our Blood.

—'Tis hoped, therefore, the Example of other Countries, the Complaints of our Plantations, and the pressing Necessity of our own Affairs, will speedily induce us to adopt a very different System of Policy, than what has hitherto regulated our Conduct, as the future may not prove altogether so favourable to our Wishes, if we suffer the new to be lost.

L O N D O N, February 9.

ON Saturday Night, about Nine o'Clock, a Duel was fought, at the Star and Garter Tavern in Pallmall, between a certain Nobleman and a Gentleman possessed of a large Estate in Nottinghamshire: when the latter was run thro' the Body, and died Yesterday Morning about Ten o'Clock.

Last Night the Coroner's Inquest sat on the Body of the unfortunate Mr. Chaworth, that was killed in the Duel with Lord Byron, but had not brought in a Verdict when this Paper went to Press. We are assured he was sensible to the last, had his Will made before he died; and on Sunday, at Noon, an Express was sent to his Mother in Nottinghamshire, to inform her of the melancholy Accident that had happened.

February 14. This Day, about eleven o'Clock, Mr. John Williams, Bookfeller in Fleet Street, was brought, pursuant to his Sentence, from the King's Bench Prison, to stand in the Pillory in New Palace Yard, Westminster, for republishing the North Briton, N° 45, in Volumes. It is remarkable, that the Coach which carried him there, was N° 45. A few Minutes after Twelve he mounted, amidst the repeated Acclamations of upwards of Ten Thousand People, who never ceased shouting till his Hour of standing was expired. Opposite to the Pillory were erected four Ladders with Cords running from each other, on which were hung a Jack Boot, an Ax, and a Scotch Bonnet. The two latter, after remaining there some Time, were burnt, and the Boot beheaded.

During his standing, also, a Purple Party, very richly ornamented with Ribbons of an Orange Colour, was produced by a Gentleman noted for his Patriotism, who began a Collection in favour of the Culprit, by putting a Guinea into it himself, after which the Purse being carried round, every Body contributed according to his own fancy, to the Amount in the Whole, as supposed, of upwards of 200 Guineas: One Gentleman it is said gave 50 Guineas. Mr. Williams, at getting into the Pillory, and at getting out, politely bowed to the Spectators. He held a Sprig of Laurel in his Hand all the Time.

We hear a Bill is now preparing for the Approbation of the House, to curtail the Time limited for the Arrival of the Female Sex to the Age of Discretion according to Law, by one full Year.

It is now said that the future Use of Stills in the British American Provinces, except in Cases of Chymistry and Medicine, will this Session be prohibited under an high Penalty. [It is to be Hoped we shall still be allowed the Use of Ovens, and not be obliged to import our Hot Rolls! Or, Starve!]

There is a Report of some Alterations being to be made in the Duties on Tobacco.

Last Saturday Evening the Wife of a Publican at Rotherhithe was lately brought to Bed of Twins, both Males; and a few Hours after, a young Woman, (a Lodger in the House) was also delivered of Twins, both Females. What is more remarkable, the latter has sworn the Publican to be the Father of her Children.

February 20. We are informed, since the Plantation Agents have failed in opposing the intended Duty on American Stamps, a Motion is preparing to be made in the House, that the Commissioner for the Receipt of this Duty may be appointed from the Natives of each Province, where the Tax is to take Place.

When Mr. Williams, Bookfeller, in Fleet Street, after standing in the Pillory on Thursday last, returned to the King's Bench Prison in the Hackney Coach, N° 45, which drove him from thence and waited all the Time, he asked the Coachman what was his Demand, who replied, That he would not take any Thing; but Mr. Williams insisting on paying him, the Coachman warmly declared, the Honour of driving him on that Occasion was a sufficient Reward for his Trouble; and absolutely refused receiving any Payment.

February 26. On Sunday Evening the Right Hon. Lord Byron arrived from France, at his House in Great Marlborough Street, and Yesterday surrendered himself at the Bar of the Right Hon. the House of Peers, and was committed to the Tower.

On the 13th Instant the Lords Justices of Ireland issued a Proclamation, offering a Reward of 300 l. for the apprehending Nicholas Sheehy, Popish Priest of Shanragan, in the County of Tipperary, who not only stands indicted at an Assize for that County the 28th of March last, for High Treason and Rebellion, but is also charged on Oath with having been since concerned in several treasonable Practices to raise a Rebellion in that Kingdom.

March 2. Yesterday there was a Board of Works, when Orders were given for the Scaffolding in Westminster Hall to be erected and finished, for the Trial of Lord Byron, against the 16th of April.

PROVIDENCE, (N. E.) April 13.
By a Letter from London in the last Ship to Boston, we are acquainted, That Col. ISAAC BARRE, Member of Parliament for the Borough of Chip-ping Wycomb, in the County of Bucks, distinguished himself gloriously in Parliament, by a strenuous Opposition of ministerial Projections against the known Rights of the Colonies, which were most unconstitutionally attacked by the Commons of Great Britain, when they Resolved that STAMP DUTIES should be charged here.—He, openly, and with great Firmness, patronized the injured Colonies, and asserted their Privileges.—A Column ought to be erected to him in America, as a LASTING MONUMENT of the Gratitude of the People, for his Virtue, Fortitude, and animated Endeavours to rescue them from Slavery.—Should this, or any other public Mark of the warm and pious Sense we have of his Friendship and Zeal, be RESOLVED on by the Governments in North America, Free-Will Offerings would abundantly supply the Expence.

THE native Caribbees of St. Vincent are permitted to remain undisturbed in their Cottages and Grounds, and the French Inhabitants in that Island and Dominica are encouraged to continue on the Lands which they have cleared, and to enjoy their Possessions, by Virtue of Leases under the Crown in the following Manner, and subject to the following Conditions, that is to say: The Lessee is to take the Oaths of Allegiance, and make and subscribe the Declaration of Abjuration; he is to hold by his Lease only such cleared Lands, as he was at the Surrender of those Islands, and still is possessed of, excepting where his very great Convenience makes some small Alterations necessary, in which Case small Parcels of contiguous Lands may be added and comprised therein as the Commissioner shall judge reasonable.
