Second. Whether it was their Opinion, that mould the Act take Place the Duties could possibly

be paid in Gold and Silver?
Answered by the whole Body, It could not be paid in Gold and Silver even for one Year.

Third. Their Opinion was defired, whether, as the Act required, the Governor and Chief Juffice to superintend the Distributor, he should be obliged to take Charge of the Distribution of the Stamps by Order and Appointment of the Governor, if he fhould think proper to fix upon him for that Office?

Answered and advised not to take it upon him,

the Governor not being impowered by the Act to appoint, or if he was, it was left to the Chief Juftice's Option, and that it would be incompatible with his Office as Chief Justice.
