REPORT OF THE INSTITUTION FOR THE DEAF AND DUMB.—We acknowledge the receipt of the eighth Annual Report of the Institution for the Deaf and Dumb, located in this city. The Report embraces a large amount of information relative to the workings of this very worthy institution and shows very careful and judicious management on the part of those entrusted with its affairs. The total number of pupils during the last year was 102, of which 50 were from Baltimore, 3 from Frederick county and the remainder from other portions of the State. In the Industrial Department a Cabinet Shop has been added which has proved to be of immense benefit to a number of the pupils, is giving them instructions in a very profitable and useful trade while the Shoe Department under charge of Mr. Robert Thomas, has also given equal proof of its usefulness and capacity. The health of the pupils has been excellent and reflects great credit upon the physician in charge, Dr. W. H. Balzell. The finances have been economically managed and in a manner that cannot fail to be highly satisfactory to all concerned. Prof. Ely the Principal and his assistants have proved themselves faithful workers, and skillful educators of the unfortunate ones entrusted to their charge. The Institution is in a very flourishing condition, as shown by the Report, which we have no doubt will still greatly augmented and increased by proper management and judicious treatment.—*Fred. J. 
