DIED.—At her home near U. V. depot yesterday morning, Mrs. J. J. Jones, wife of E. S. Jones. Her illness was short, but she was a kind and loving wife. She will be missed at the cemetery.

The condition of affairs at Maryland remains unchanged. The U. S. Regulars under Col. French, numbering 300 are quartered in the company's warehouses; immediately opposite the Berkeley Hotel, and the Whiting militia, numbering about 40 men are also the Berkeley Light Infantry, the total number of soldiers in Maritime barracks is about 450 men. We noticed a great many of the regulars about town drinking with the railroad men, and some of them too drunk to take care of their own property, much less that of anyone else.

The railroad officials are very busy and are using every endeavor to have the trains started early, and at 11 o'clock a train was got ready, but before it could get started the strikers compelled the men to leave the train. Another attempt was made later in the day to start another train, and Charles Bedford, an engineer, mounted the engine. The wife of the engineer then walked up to the engine and compelled him to get down, at which there was much cheering by the strikers. From 1 o'clock until 3 the train stood still waiting for a force of men to take it out.

A committee of the strikers waited upon Gen French and said they did not want to be misrepresented, as it was reported to get into circulation that it was the strikers who had obstructed the road, which was caused by the men, and leaving it standing upon the main track, when it was caused by the men employed by the company. The General referred the matter to Col. Sharp.

It is anticipated that trouble will arise during the night as the strikers believe that it is the intention of the company to run the trains out under cover of the darkness, and they think that a more favorable opportunity for them than in daylight. There seems to be as much fraternization between the regulars and railroad men as there was with the State troops.
