#### COMMUNICATED.

Once upon a time there lived a man in a quiet and an orderly village, this man had been a citizen of the town for many years and had proved himself to be one of the most respectable and honored citizens of the place and a useful member of society, he traveled a great deal and with the knowledge he had gained in that way coupled with an academic and collegiate education made him very glib of tongue. So it was no wonder when the idea flashed across his brain that it was wrong for people to drink intoxicating liquor that he made up his mind to take the field in person to lead the hosts of temperance in his own town and county in a great crusade against the monster of intemperance. He led, or he was rather a leader among leaders, he talked in private, he spoke in public to show the great evil of indulging in strong drink. We remember of hearing him discoursing very eloquently in the streets and in the woods to crowds of people of all ages and sexes trying by his great persuasive powers and bursts of eloquence to induce the moderate drinker and the confirmed drunkard both to become teetotalers and never to touch, taste nor handle the unclean thing, but with all the eloquence and energy displayed the converts were few, and people continued in their old habits, the moderate drinker to take his occasional glass, and yet others to drink to excess, it greatly grieved this gentleman to think that so much time and energy had been wasted upon a people who was ever ready to hear but would not be convinced, so he came to the conclusion that he would waste no more time or eloquence upon the subject so ably discussed, and all the evils thereof set forth in the most glaring light, he rested his case for the time being, but a man with the energy and the capacity that this man is endowed with cannot possibly be long idle as he concludes that idleness is the chief workshop of satan, and whisky drinking one of the principal effects of idleness, taking this for a text his imagination led him on a new plan to benefit his fellow man, and with energy and determination he started on this grand and philanthropic path which is labor reform, his first great idea is to keep every person employed allow no one to be idle and to do so he labored to teach the workingman that by uniting in an association of their own they would be able to build workshops and manufacture such articles and goods that would be ready sale, and that would bring them fair profits over and above the cost of material and the labor to produce or manufacture them and to continue on in adding capital in this way until their shops grow so large that they would be able to give employment to all unemployed labor. He made some stirring and eloquent addresses on this subject, and really convinced many people that the idea was well worth considering, and another point he strongly argued was that if a laboring man produced six hundred dollars per annum by his labor that man was equivalent to ten thousand dollars in capital, and that the laboring classes, or rather men who earned their bread by the sweat of their brow, were far superior to the capitalists in energy and in inventive genius that they were better able to take care of themselves than the non-producers, that the laboring man was the bone and sinew of the land. The people who made this country prosperous were the laboring classes, they worked

to feed themselves and also the dependents but that they so far had been working to keep up capital and to make the rich richer. Still, in this way the speaker would work up his audience to the highest point of enthusiasm, on one Sabbath day he held forth to a large crowd of people in the woods and as he was a man with a powerful voice the sound went forth as it were miles upon miles the echoes resounded and the re-echo's traveled along every and along railroad lines, everywhere and wherever the sound of that voice went the working men learned that the time had come when they should no longer be the slaves of monopolies, but gird on their armor, and to strive for their rights and they could free themselves and make terms upon their own conditions, believing that when they heard, hundreds of employees of a great corporation ceased work, and demanded that they should be paid more wages before they would resume and that no one should take their places.

These demands were not acceded to by the officers of the great corporation, but it had the effect to cause employees of other corporations to pursue the same course almost throughout the entire country, hundreds and thousands of men ceased to work, and refused to allow other men to work in their stead. Trades and business of all kinds in every section of the country were paralyzed and at a stand still, bad and dangerous men assumed the cause of the strikers and took the lead; they were joined by another class of bad and vicious men who were called tramps, they were known as that name because they did not intend to labor for a livelihood, but tramped from place to place begging, stealing, and living by their wits, as they termed it, and the manner of their living made them a very dangerous vicious class of men, and this mobley crew united, as it were, but having different objects in view, the strikers bent on having an increase of pay, the other class determined on robbery, arson and murder, the consequence was many valuable lives were lost, millions of dollars worth of property was destroyed by the torch, and many thousands of dollars more of provision and other property were stolen by the rabble and their friends. Civil law proved futile to vindicate it, self and the State Governments were called upon to assist to keep down the riots that the strikers had inaugurated, but even this force proved inadequate to quell the disturbance, and the National Government was appealed to to assist the State Governments in restoring order and law to their natural channels. The appeal was promptly responded to, and the disturbance was finally settled and peace and order was restored—the man who had made the speech that was the entering wedge that created all the disturbance and destruction stood appalled at the work he had done on that bright Sabbath evening.

#### TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Exasperation of the Russians.

LONDON, July 31.—The correspondent at the Russian headquarters in Biala telegraphs under date of Sunday that the Russian officers and men were dreadfully exasperated because of the defeat at Plevna and the mutilation of the dead and the massacre of the wounded by the Turks. He declares that the camp is thoroughly excited and exultant over the rumor that a great battle is to take place within a few days.

SEEKING REVENGE.

It is reported from Bucharest that the Russians have again attacked Flavia, and that the fight continued throughout Saturday and Sunday. According to the latest reports the Russians were gaining ground.

A GREAT RUSSIAN VICTORY.

A despatch from Sietova that an important engagement was fought on Sunday near Ruzstok between the Czar's army and Ahmed Eyoub Pacha. The Turkish corps is reported to have been defeated with the loss of thirty guns, ten standards and five thousand prisoners. Later official despatches confirm the foregoing. The number of Turkish prisoners is now given as 8,000. Ahmed Eyoub's army is stated to be completely routed. The Russians will probably resume the offensive and follow up their advantage.

THE TROUBLES AT KEYSER.

WASHINGTON, July 31.—An erroneous report having been circulated to the effect that a train was captured by the railroad strikers near Keyser, on the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, while it was in charge of Captain Littlefield, second artillery, General Hancock telegraphed to General Getty commanding the troops there, to learn the particulars, and a reply received the following telegram which is forwarded to the War Department.

COMMERCIAL, Md., July 30—

General Hancock's telegram regarding reports in the evening papers received. The facts are that an unguarded train was seized about one-half mile this side of Keyser by rioters and immediately recaptured by troops sent after it. No damage done. Captain Littlefield and his command are in no way to blame.

ATTENTION! MURDER—KILLED ON THE RAIL.

ELIZABETH, N. J., July 31.—Last night some parties supposed to be strikers, threw railroad ties across the Central Railroad-track near Elizabethport Station. John Shurtz, the night dispatcher, found them shortly before the first train passed. Michael Walsh was struck last night by the locomotive of the westward bound passenger train and instantly killed. He was crossing the track.

Some of the coal and freight brakemen who struck on the Central Railroad have applied for their former positions at the old rates.

The company thus far refuse employment to the strikers. The coal and freight trains are run as fast as new brakemen can be hired to take them. The passenger trains run regularly. The militia here was dismissed last night.

**NOW TO WORK.**  
The fierce epain which swept through this country, and its every feature of mortality, its torment, straining every artery, nerve, obstructing every artery, and wringing every fibre, is over, and we may now begin with returning consciousness to look about us and gather our strength to start afresh. It has been lost, scorched, wasted during the violent season from which we have emerged. But it is not before, but it is completely stopped for eight or ten days, and we have grown almost hopeless in the contemplation of the present and dread of the future.

Why then should we stop? Let us be retrieved, save by going resolutely forward and putting in two links more than we were accustomed to put only one before. Let capitalists seize hold of their enterprises with force and confidence than ever, for the strike and its results have settled the controversy between trade-unions and capital for years to come. Let workmen enter more zealously than ever upon their employment, determined to make up for the losses of the past two weeks and in the full realization that as labor as in every other competition will prevail and that the best, most reliable and skillful will win in the race for life.

These results are inevitable and must and should be cheerfully met. Let there be no whining, no grumbling, no sad or sour countenances. Let every man brighten up and do cheerfully whatever his hand is laid to, comforting the helpless and encouraging and inspiring his comrades. That is the way to bring good things, Glum looks and choleric expressions will make the brightest prospects look dull and melancholy. A cheerful, crisp voice and jolly face will bring sunshine where it was cloudy before, and invite business where it lagged and languished. The man who greets his neighbor with a sorrowful frown and dull times, helps to increase the public complaint. He who smiles at fortune's freaks and prophesies a change for the better, sends a sympathetic thrill through the pulse of the community, for one brighter face encouraged and strengthened hand will have its influence and many so encouraged must give an impetus to hope and ambition. Man is a sympathetic animal and our passions, fears and anticipations are contagious. One hopeful fellow will brighten up a crowd—what will many hopeful deeds do? Try it: business must and will revive: we are on the eve of it, and the reaction will set in all the elements and more noticeably because of the stagnation of the last ten days. Look out for it and you will see it. The crops will move, money will circulate, the idle will be employed and as tomorrow better labor will enhance its value until we are back to our days of prosperity and plenty again.
