# of Suit to Open Maryland University

## Md. U. Defended Lily-White Policy with Wooden Guns

N.A.A.C.P. Preliminary Victory in Lower Court Demonstrates Effectiveness of Its Program Against Educational Inequalities in Southern States and Preparedness of Its Lawyers; Maryland State Colored Teachers' Association, Like Five Foolish Virgins, Still Sleeps.

## AN EDITORIAL

The oral opinion of Judge O'Dunne in the Baltimore Court directing the University of Maryland, a State Institution, to open its law school to Donald Murray, Amherst graduate, is a well-earned victory for the N.A.A.C.P. and its trio of brilliant lawyers, headed by Dr. Charles H. Houston, of the Howard University law school.

This State university, supported by taxpayers to the tune of over a million dollars every two years, has considered itself a university for white people only, thereby excluding 300,000 colored persons of their rights and privileges as citizens and taxpayers.

What should make every thinking citizen with concern in that he for the hesitancy, backwardness and downright dilly-dally policy of the Maryland State Colored Teachers' Association, who might have had today two victories instead of one.

This association has offered financial aid of interested citizens if it would produce one teacher who would be willing to file a suit and contest the State's nefarious practice of paying colored teachers salaries, in some cases, 40 per cent lower than white teachers doing the same sort of work.

Like the five foolish virgins, the association slumbers and sleeps. The citizens are still interested, the money is still available; will the State teachers still snooze on?

Also, it needs to be pointed out, that the opening of the University of Maryland is but the first step in the N.A.A.C.P. campaign against educational discrimination in Southern States. Its next case will be filed in Norfolk, Va.

Meantime, there are other inequalities in educational opportunities in Maryland that are crying for court action. It would be well to compel the State to give colored children a school term equal with white children. It would be well to compel the State and the counties to provide equality in school buildings and equipment.

It would be well to compel the State to provide equal transportation facilities for colored children living long distances from rural schools. And, finally, suit must be filed to compel the State and the counties to give colored teachers equal salaries with white teachers.

So the University of Maryland suit, won by the N.A.A.C.P. lawyers far ahead, is only the beginning. But what a beginning! It demonstrates the effectiveness of the N.A.A.C.P. program, the fine preparation of its lawyers, and the wooden guns which white State officials have long defended the lily-white policy of excluding colored taxpayers from public institutions.

# COURT ENDS M.D.'S COLOR BAR

### Court Orders U. of Md. to Admit Amherst Graduate

#### Houston Leads NAACP Cohorts to Victory in Murray Case.

#### SCHOLARSHIP OFFER DISCOVERED A FAKE

#### Asst. Attorney-General Hopes Student Will Lead.

BALTIMORE—The action of the University of Maryland in refusing Donald Gaines Murray, Amherst College graduate, from its law school because of his color, was declared illegal by a decision of Judge Eugene O'Donne, Tuesday, in the Baltimore City Court.

U. of M. C. P. lawyers, led by Dr. Charles H. Houston, special counsel for the organization, defended Murray's plea for a writ of mandamus, requiring the university to accept him upon his entrance qualifications.

Judge O'Donne, after hearing the testimony in the controversy, ruled that the case was past the investigation stage and issued a writ of mandamus that requires the institution to admit the applicant at the law school.

Reports indicate that the State will appeal the case, but Charles F. LeVinas, Jr., white, assistant attorney general, would not comment on the question.

At the conclusion of the case, however, Mr. LeVinas said, "I wish to be quoted as saying that I hope that Mr. Murray leads the way in the law school and graduate school."

He made this statement while changing hands with the Amherst graduate.

From the beginning, in the early hours of the morning, to the close of 5 p. m.—past normal closing time—the case was a sharp contest of legal argument and court work.

The argument in the case was opened by Mr. Houston, special attorney for the NAACP.

Mr. Houston pointed out that the action is being brought against the State in the right of Mr. Murray to enter the institution. He quoted the charter of the University.
