

Liber K. as would not take the Oaths tho' they were Protestants to which it was answered him, that unknown there were a great many such in England that after the French Fleet was beaten and the Plot or Design was discovered and did not take Effect there were several thous<sup>d</sup> of Horses found in England accoutred for war, but no Body durst own them & as for those Persons in the Countrey being Protestants and Refusers of the oath they were many in Virginia, the Deponent further upon his oath saith that the said Coll Digges told him that last Year to the best of this Depon<sup>t</sup>s Remembrance) one Capt Purvis should say that he expected an Alteration before he got home and that this & the like Discourses was very publickly talked on in Virginia & in England without any notice taken thereof & that S<sup>r</sup> Edmond Andros himself Governor of Virginia did in pticular freely & openly talk of the same among his Councill  
 p. 198 who also did the same without the least notice taken that Sir Edmond shewed him the said Digges the Proclamations which he brought out of England with him & had delivered abroad several Copys thereof, some as the Deponent thinks to some in this Countrey whereupon Madam Digges did say that S<sup>r</sup> Edmond came over upon the Acco<sup>t</sup> of Continuing Governor for King James after the alteration that was expected, And the Deponent further saith not

The Deposition of Gilbert Turbeville of S<sup>t</sup> Marys  
 County Gent aged Five or Six & Fourty Years  
 or thereabouts as follows (viz<sup>t</sup>)

The Deponent upon Oath taken on the holy Evangelist saith that on or about the 12<sup>th</sup> day of this Instant March having been at Church & going home with M<sup>r</sup> Garret Vansweeringen & M<sup>r</sup> Iohn Evans between S<sup>t</sup> Inigos & M<sup>r</sup> Pattisons Plantation, the said Vansweeringen begun a discourse saying there were two Dukes of Gloster, the one was Prince George's Son adopted in England the other King James' Son Born in France & that the French King had sent a safe conduct into England for the Nobles to Come over into France & see the birth of the Prince & that the Queens Body was exposed to the View of several of the Nobles & two Bishops at the time of her Delivery who did see the Child Born into the World that there were Articles of Agreement between the Kingdom of England & King James publickly up & down in Print everywhere in England in every Boys hands & a General Pardon for all excepting some few Particular men
