c. c. advised us of the strength of his Teams or the Forwardness he is in, in the Removal of the Stores, we have advised it from the first and frequently repeated it. We think, in good Boats & careful Hands, the Arms might be sent safely by Water to Alexandria, they ought to call here and a Look out Boat, & better two, if we can muster them, should be sent at least fifteen miles ahead, with Directions to run up Patuxent, here or Patapsco, on a Signal agreed on. We would prefer this Mode as endangering much less, the Breaking of the Arms, its being more expeditious and if absolutely necessary, giving us a Chance of using them ourselves. Miller may not get up so soon as this, we inclose you the Information he gives to Sir &ca
