[Veto of Act of 1745, Laying an Imposition on Tobacco.]

Charles Absolute Lord & Proprietary of the Province of Maryland & Avalon, Lord Baron of Baltimore &c. To our right Trusty & well beloved Tho: Bladen Esq^r Our Lieutenant Governor of our Province of Maryland and to Our Right Trusty & well Beloved the Upper & Lower Houses of our Assembly, there & to all others in Our said Province of Maryland for the time being Greeting Whereas at a Sessions of Assembly begun & held at Annapolis in our said Province of Maryland the fifth day of August in the Thirty first Year of our Dominion over the said Province of Maryland Anno Domini 1745 An Act Entituled An Act for Laying an Imposition on Tobacco and Other Commodities therein mention'd for the Discharge of his Lordships Quit-rents & support of Government passed into a Law, on due Consideration thereof Wee have thought fit to dissent, to the said Act, and do hereby declare the said Act Null & Void, and of no Effect.
