2 est. This is statutory language. At the risk of being
3 redundant it has been in the statutes for decades, and in
4 some instances almost essential. There is no reason to
5 think that this language is ever going to be changed by
6 the General Assembly, but in the event that the General
7 Assembly should wish to change it, this change, exactly
8 what Delegate Kirkland is talking about, should be fully
9 considered by the General Assembly, which meets every year,
10 rather than by a constitutional convention, which may meet
11 only every one hundred years.

12 In closing, this amendment does not affect in
13 any way Sections 2, 3 or 5 of the Majority Report; amend-
14 ments to delete these sections will be offered later on.
15 At this time we urge the adoption of the Minority Amend-
16 ment 1.
