

1 I will not trouble you with going at length  
2 through the Minority Report. It has been presented to you  
3 and I will try to limit my appeal to about five minutes,  
4 if you will promise to read the minority report sometime  
5 while the majority is talking.

6 Judge Sherbow has already anticipated most of the  
7 minority report. He has set it up, and he has decimated it  
8 with his argument, and we will not trouble you with it again.

9 Fortunately, most of the items which he covered  
10 we did not intend to cover, anyway.

11 There are four basic points to our report.  
12 The first is that we readily agree that there is a strong  
13 argument that a lottery or any system of lottery, either  
14 controlled by the State or its subdivisions, or by inde-  
15 pendent parties will not necessarily relieve the State and  
16 its citizens of the entire tax burden. We do not feel  
17 that the lottery will supplant all the income taxes and all  
18 the sales taxes and all the property taxes and all the  
19 other taxes.

20 We feel that it may still be necessary, even if  
21 the legislature some day saw fit to have a lottery that
