

1 at Yorktown in my opinion fades into insignificance in  
2 the way we approach this subject. We need in the Attorney  
3 General a man who fearlessly serves one client.

4 Now, it is my very firm feeling, strengthened  
5 by the colloquy this morning before this Convention, that  
6 the best way that this problem can be met to serve the  
7 purposes of all the people of this State is to have an  
8 Attorney General appointed by the Governor who can then have  
9 such legal duties as are assigned to him by the Governor  
10 and who would meet all of the challenges that have been  
11 put before him.

12 The Legislature could have its own counsel, or  
13 any other department could have its own counsel, and we  
14 would operate somewhat as the Federal Government does.

15 I want to say, again, that as this matter comes  
16 out we have got to decide and put in the Constitution for  
17 all time, I think the main thing that we must realize --  
18 and possibly in the paraphrase of the cigarette slogan --  
19 it's not how wrong you make it, but how you make it wrong.

20 I think the important thing that we as Delegates  
21 have got to know is that when we establish an Attorney
