Gentlemen—In submitting his annual report, the undersigned is constrained to acknowledge the goodness of Divine Providence in preserving the health of the College, and defending its inmates from all contagious and deadly diseases, and in the bestowment of all needful blessings.

At the date of my last report to the Legislature, (January 6, 1870,) made through the Board of Trustees, there were eighty students in attendance.
