HABEAS CORPUS.

PROCEDENDO may be awarded on the return of a *habeas corpus*. October, 1778, ch. 21, sec. 11.
An *Allocatur* not necessary in civil cases to *certiorari* or *habeas corpus*. July, 1779, ch. 4.

HAMBURG.

To have a warehouse. November, 1783, ch. 41.

HARBOURS.

Injuries done to them punishable. 1774, ch. 18.

HARFORD COUNTY.

Created by the division of Baltimore county, and public buildings ordered. November, 1773, ch. 6.

The building of the court-house suspended. 1774, ch. 13.

Further time given to collect the money for that purpose. February, 1777, ch. 7.

An election ordered to fix the seat of justice. November, 1781, ch. 10.

A supplement to that act. 1784, ch. 10.

HORSES.

The act of 1744, ch. 20, for punishment of horse-stealers, is continued for seven years by the act of October, 1780, ch. 12. November, 1765, ch. 25.

A supplement to the act respecting horse-rangers, height of fences, &c. 1769, ch. 18.

HOUSE-BREAKING.

The act of 1737, ch. 2, punishing among other crimes that of house-breaking, continued for seven years by the act of November, 1782, ch. 32. November, 1765, ch. 20.

IMPRESSING.

CARRIAGES, boats, &c. may be impressed to expedite the march of troops. February, 1777, ch. 4.

INDEMNITY.

An act to indemnify the executive and others, who, on an extraordinary emergency, had exercised powers not warranted by law. October, 1777, ch. 17.

INDICTMENTS.

How they shall conclude. Const. 57.

INFANT.

Infants, idiots, &c. under direction of chancery, empowered to convey lands held on trust, or by mortgage, or charged with money or tobacco. November, 1773, ch. 7, sec. 1.

Infants in the army empowered to devise real property by a resolve of the convention. October 26, 1776.

Infants bound by guardians deeds made under direction of chancery. October, 1778, ch. 22.

INSPECTORS.

Acts for their special appointment are, June, 1777, ch. 13, October, 1777, ch. 22, March, 1778, ch. 10, October, 1778, ch. 11, July, 1779, ch. 19, November, 1779, ch. 41.

INSURRECTIONS.

A temporary provision made against them. March, 1778, ch. 8.

IRELAND.

The act of 1735, ch. 6, laying a duty on Irish servants, and prohibiting the importation of papists, is continued for twenty-one years by the act of June, 1773, ch. 2. November, 1765, ch. 18.

JUDGMENT.

TO be rendered on award after it shall have remained seven days in the general, or four days in the county court. October, 1778, ch. 21, sec. 8, 9, 12.

JUDGES.

The manner of preserving their independence, and of removing them. Decl. 30, and Const. 40.

They shall not hold any other office, or receive any fees or perquisites. Decl. 30.

To take an oath before they elect. Const. 50.

To swear that they will not hold any other office. Const. 52.

Their punishment for violating that oath. Const. 53.

JURY.

The trial by jury recognised. Decl. 3, 21.

The number of jurors from each county prescribed. February, 1777, ch. 15, sec. 10.

KENT COUNTY.

KING WILLIAM'S SCHOOL.

Trustees entitled to receive gifts, &c. to the amount of £. 200 sterling, annual income, and any seven of them enabled to act. 1774, ch. 15.

Provision for filling the vacancies among the visitors. June, 1778, ch. 5.

KALB, BARON DE.

The sons of that brave officer, who fell in the service of America, placed on the footing of natural born subjects. October, 1780, ch. 37.

LAND-OFFICE.

THIS office opened, registers and an examiner-general to be appointed, grants directed. November, 1781, ch. 20.

Sundry regulations and a time given to compound on old certificates. April, 1782, ch. 38.

A further time to compound on old certificates. November, 1782, ch. 5.

Grants authorised. 1784, ch. 75.

LAWS.

What are the laws of the land. Decl. 3, 41.

They ought not to be sanguinary, retrospective, or made to attain particular persons. Decl. 14, 15, 16.

To be administered freely, fully, speedily. Decl. 17.

No power of suspending them, unless derived from the legislature. Decl. 7.
