

Baltimore, one of which shall be printed in the German language, and one newspaper in each county having the largest circulation, if there be a newspaper published in said county.

2. A certified copy of every public general law made to take effect as aforesaid, shall be transmitted by mail, by the secretary of the Senate (if the same originated in the Senate), and by the chief clerk of the House of Delegates (if the same originated in the House of Delegates), to such two daily newspapers of the city of Baltimore, and one newspaper in each county, having the largest circulation (if there be a newspaper published in said county), as the president of the Senate and the speaker of the House of Delegates may respectively designate for publication, as provided in the first section of this article.

3. The treasurer, upon the warrant of the comptroller, shall pay to the publishers of the newspapers in which the public general laws are printed in conformity with the first section of this article, the compensation to which they may respectively be entitled for printing said general laws, within six months from the time of publication.

4. Every public local law, made to take effect before the first day of June next after the session at which it may be passed, shall immediately after its passage be published, once in each of three successive weeks in such newspapers of the respective counties in which it may operate as the county commissioners may direct, and in case any such law is to operate in the city of Baltimore, then once in each week for three successive weeks in such daily newspapers published in said city, as the mayor thereof may direct, and the mayor and city council of Baltimore and the county commissioners of the several counties shall provide for payment of the expenses of such publication. This section shall not apply to Washington County.

5. A certified copy of every public local law made to take effect as aforesaid, shall immediately after its passage be transmitted by mail, by the secretary of the Senate (if the same originated in the Senate), and by the chief clerk of the House of Delegates (if the same originated in the House of Delegates), to the county commissioners of the county or counties in which the same may operate, or to the mayor of the city of Baltimore, if the same is to operate in that city; and it shall be the duty of the said county commissioners and mayor, upon receipt of such certified copy, to have the same published as provided in the preceding section.
