BERRY, WILLIAM (ca. 1636-1691). BORN: ca. 1636, possibly in Virginia; first son, IMMIGRATED: in 1652/53 as a minor with his family from Virginia. RESIDED: in Calvert County: Talbot County at the time of his death. FAMILY BACKGROUND. FATHER: James Berry (?-1666). MOTHER: Elizabeth. BROTHER: Roger. SISTER: Martha. MAR-RIED first, Naomi (?-1663), daughter of Richard Preston (?-ca. 1669/70). Her brothers were Richard (?-by 1669); James, and Samuel. Her sisters were Margaret; Rebecca; and Sarah, who married William Ford (?-1678/79), MARRIED second, in 1669 Margaret (?-1688), widow of Richard Preston (?-by 1669); daughter of Thomas Marsh (ca. 1615-1656/57). BESSON, THOMAS (ca. 1617–1679). BORN: ca. 1617 in England. IMMIGRATED: in 1649 as a free adult with his family from Virginia. ADDITIONAL COMMENTS: transported to Virginia in 1638 by Robert Freeman, a merchant. RESIDED: in Anne Arundel County. MARRIED Hester, widow of Henry Caplin. She subsequenly married by 1680 Thomas Sutton. CHILDREN. SONS: Thomas; William; and John. DAUGHTERS: Anne, who married Nicholas Gassaway (1634–1691/92); Martha. PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCATION: literate. RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION: Protestant, probably a Puritan. SO-

BIGGER, JOHN (ca. 1654-1714). BORN: ca. 1654, certainly by 1657, in Calvert County. NA-TIVE: second generation, RESIDED: in Calvert County. FAMILY BACKGROUND. FATHER: John Bigger (ca. 1634-ca. 1673), who immigrated in 1652 as an indentured servant and became a planter with over 3,000 acres. MOTHER: Ann, who subsequently married James Rumsey. BROTHER: James Bigger. SISTER: Mary, who married James Stockley (?-1676), son of Woodman Stockley (?-ca. 1663). MARRIED Ann, daughter of Dr. James Trueman and wife Ann Storer; niece of Thomas Trueman (ca. 1625-1685). Her stepbrother was Robert Skinner (?-1713). Her half brothers were Clark Skinner; William Skinner; and Adderton Skinner (ca. 1677-1756). Her sisters were Mary, who married Thomas Hollyday (ca. 1661-1702/3): Martha, who married Thomas Greenfield (ca. 1649-1715); and Elizabeth. Her stepsister or half sister was Mary Skinner. CHILDREN. DAUGHTER: Ann, who married first, William Head, and second, James Gibson. PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCA-TION: literate. RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION: Protestant. SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES: closely related by marriage to the powerful Skinner, Greenfield, and Hollyday families. OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE: planter. PUBLIC CAREER.
