

Scotland. IMMIGRATED: by 1689/90 as a free adult. RESIDED: in Dorchester County. FAMILY BACKGROUND. UNCLE: William Campbell, a merchant of Dumbarton, Scotland. MARRIED first, by 1701 Susannah. MARRIED second, by 1731 Elizabeth, daughter of William Robson. Her sisters were Hagar, who married *John Meekins* (ca. 1674–1734); Jane, who married *Tobias Pollard* (ca. 1669–1749). PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCATION: illiterate. RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION: Presbyterian. SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES: Gent., by 1697; perhaps he was transferred from his justiceship to a shrievalty in 1695 by Gov. Francis Nicholson because of his illiteracy. OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE: planter; merchant. PUBLIC CAREER. LEGISLATIVE SERVICE: Lower House, Dorchester County, 1697/98–1700 (Aggravances, 1–4), 1708B–1711. LOCAL OFFICES: justice, Dorchester County, 1693–1695, 1700–1734 (quorum, 1694–1695, 1700–1734); sheriff, Dorchester County, 1695–1698. MILITARY SERVICE: officer, 1696. WEALTH DURING LIFETIME. LAND AT FIRST ELECTION: 463 acres. WEALTH AT DEATH. DIED: will probated on April 13, 1738. PERSONAL PROPERTY: TEV, £644.8.10 current money (including 15 slaves); FB, £383.0.5. LAND: over 1,100 acres.

CAMPBELL, ZACHARIAH (?–1777). BORN: probably in Glasgow, Scotland, of age by 1767. IMMIGRATED: by 1767 from Virginia. RESIDED: in Vienna, Dorchester County. FAMILY BACKGROUND. BROTHER: Capt. James (?–ca. 1782), commander of the brigantine of war *Sturdy Beggar*, 1777. MARRIED by 1767 Mary (ca. 1745–1779), daughter of Levin Hicks (?–1753) and wife Mary Hooper Ennalls; granddaughter of both Levin Hicks (?–1731) and wife Mary Hooper (?–ca. 1757), and *Henry Hooper* (ca. 1687–1767); step-granddaughter of *John Rider* (1686–1739/40); niece of *Henry Hooper, Jr.* (ca. 1727–1790), Ann Hicks (?–1773), who married *Henry Travers* (?–1765); stepniece of Dorothy Rider (1725–?), who married *John Henry* (ca. 1714–1781). Her brother was Levin (1748–?), who never married. Her first cousin was *William Ennalls Hooper* (?–1795). CHILDREN. SON: Levin Hicks (ca. 1774–?). DAUGHTERS: Ann (ca. 1778–?); Elizabeth, who married Richard Henry Handy (ca. 1772–?); Mary (?–by 1796), who married David Smith; and Isabella, who married by 1796 David Smith, her brother-in-law. PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCATION: literate. SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES: Gent., 1776. OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE: probably a planter. PUBLIC CAREER. LEGISLATIVE SERVICE: Convention, Dorchester County, 3rd, 1774. OTHER STATE OFFICE:

naval officer, Sixth District, appointed 1777. LOCAL OFFICES: collector of blankets, clothing, and other necessities for the American Army, Nanticoke Hundred, Dorchester County, appointed 1777. MILITARY SERVICE: captain, Transquakin Company, Dorchester County Militia, commissioned 1776. WEALTH DURING LIFETIME. PERSONAL PROPERTY: 13 slaves, 1776. LAND AT FIRST ELECTION: 308 acres in Dorchester County (255 acres through marriage; 50 acres by purchase; 3 acres by patent). SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN LAND BETWEEN FIRST ELECTION AND DEATH: acquired 585 acres in Dorchester County (inherited by his wife after her brother died without progeny), by 1776. WEALTH AT DEATH. DIED: between February and August 1777. PERSONAL PROPERTY: size of estate unknown. LAND: 893 acres in Dorchester County.

CARLINE, HENRY (ca. 1608–?). IMMIGRATED: in 1651 as a free adult with his wife. RESIDED: in Kent County. MARRIED Rachel, who subsequently married William Head. PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCATION: illiterate. RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION: converted to Quakerism in 1658. SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES: Mr. on arrival; brought two servants with him; no record of him as being in Maryland after 1664. OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE: planter. PUBLIC CAREER. LEGISLATIVE SERVICE: Lower House, Kent County, 1663–1664. LOCAL OFFICES: justice, Kent County, 1654/55–1655/56; sheriff, Kent County, 1656–1657. WEALTH AT DEATH. LAND: at least 188 acres.

CARMICHAEL, RICHARD BENNETT (1753–1824). BORN: in 1753 in Queen Anne's County; his mother was pregnant with him when she married Carmichael. NATIVE: second generation. RESIDED: in Queen Anne's County; lived part of each year in Wilmington, Delaware, by 1813. FAMILY BACKGROUND. STEPFATHER OR POSSIBLY FATHER: William Carmichael (?–1769), immigrated from Scotland, died at Roundtop, near the Chester River, Queen Anne's County; a merchant. MOTHER: Ann (1712–ca. 1754), daughter of Roger Brooke (1673–1718), of Prince George's County, and wife Elizabeth Hutchins. STEPBROTHERS OR HALF BROTHERS: Walter; James (?–1778), a ship's captain, who married Selitia Emory Kirby; William (?–1795), of Chestertown, Kent County, an attorney, who was educated in Edinburgh, Scotland. He was a diplomat who served in Paris as secretary to the commissioners Silas Deane, Benjamin Franklin, and Arthur Lee, who were attempting to persuade France to aid the colonies, ca. 1775; dele-
