

TIONAL COMMENTS: Duckett and Samuel Tyler were indebted to the firm of Wallace, Johnson, & Muir, Annapolis merchants, for £2,300.0.0 sterling, and in order to secure payment of this debt they mortgaged a total of 1,090 acres in Prince George's County to the firm in 1789. WEALTH AT DEATH. DIED: on December 2, 1806, in Prince George's County. PERSONAL PROPERTY: TEV, £6,235.11.3 (including 49 slaves and 97 oz. plate); FB, £4,649.7.0. LAND: 929 acres in Prince George's County.

DULANY, BENJAMIN TASKER (1752–1816). BORN: in 1752 in Annapolis; younger son. NATIVE: third generation. RESIDED: in Frederick County until 1777; Alexandria, Fairfax County, Virginia, 1777 until death. FAMILY BACKGROUND. FATHER: *Daniel Dulany, Jr.* (1722–1797). MOTHER: Rebecca (1724–1822), daughter of *Benjamin Tasker* (ca. 1690–1768) and wife Anne Bladen. UNCLES: *Walter Dulany* (?–1773); *Benjamin Tasker, Jr.* (1720/21–1760). AUNTS: Ann Tasker (1723–1817), who married *Samuel Ogle* (1694–1752); Margaret Dulany, who married first, *Alexander Hamilton* (1712–1756), and second, *William Murdock* (?–1769). BROTHER: Daniel (1750–1824), a barrister, Lincoln's Inn, London, England. SISTER: Ann (Nancy) (?–1828), who married on April 21, 1784, William Delasserre, divorced by May 1800 when she petitioned for a change of name for herself and her daughter Rebecca. FIRST COUSIN: *James Heath* (?–1766). OTHER KINSHIP: his great-grandfather was *William Bladen* (1670–1718); his great-uncle was *Thomas Bladen* (1698–1780). MARRIED in February 1773 Elizabeth, daughter of Daniel French (?–by 1773), of "Claremont," Virginia, and wife Penelope Manly; goddaughter of George Washington (1731/32–1799). CHILDREN. Six sons and six daughters, including DAUGHTER: Elizabeth, who married Joseph Forrest. PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCATION: literate; studied at the Rev. Jonathan Boucher's school. RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION: Protestant. SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES: Esq., 1773. OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE: planter. PUBLIC CAREER. LEGISLATIVE SERVICE: Convention, Frederick County, 1st, 1774 (appointed, but did not attend). LOCAL OFFICES: clerk, Frederick County, commissioned 1773–out of office by May 1777; Committee of Correspondence, Frederick County, 1774. OUT OF STATE SERVICE: justice, Fairfax County, Virginia, 1787, 1801; trustee, Alexandria Academy, Alexandria, Fairfax County, Virginia. WEALTH DURING LIFETIME. PERSONAL PROPERTY: wife's dowry amounted to £20,000. 1773. LAND AT FIRST ELECTION: 3,058 acres in

Frederick County and a house in Frederick Town, Frederick County (acquired through deeds of gift from his father before his marriage). SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN LAND BETWEEN FIRST ELECTION AND DEATH: acquired 2 lots in Frederick Town, Frederick County, by 1782; sold at least 229 acres in Frederick County, 1778–1786, plus 2 lots in Frederick Town, Frederick County, 1783. WEALTH AT DEATH. DIED: in 1816 in Virginia; size of estate unknown.

DULANY (DELANEY), DANIEL (1685–1753). BORN: in 1685 in Queen's County, Ireland. IMMIGRATED: in 1703 as an indentured servant with his older brothers William and Joseph from Queen's County, Ireland. Col. George Plater (ca. 1664–1709) purchased his three-year indenture and employed him as a clerk in his law office. RESIDED: in Port Tobacco, Charles County, 1703–ca. 1713; Nottingham Town, Mattapany Hundred, Prince George's County, ca. 1713–1720; Annapolis, Anne Arundel County, 1720–1753. FAMILY BACKGROUND. FATHER: Thomas Dulany, of Queen's County, Ireland. BROTHERS: William; Joseph. MARRIED first, in 1710 Charity (1680–1711), widow of Bayne Smallwood, son of *James Smallwood* (ca. 1639–ca. 1714/15); daughter of *John Courts* (1655/56–1702); stepdaughter of *John Contee* (?–1708); granddaughter of *Robert Henley* (ca. 1617–1684); niece of Elizabeth Courts (1663–?), who married *James Keech* (ca. 1651–1708/9). Her brothers were *John Courts* (1691/92–1747/48); Charles; and William. Her sister was Ann (1693–?). Her first cousins were *Walter Smith* (ca. 1693–1748); Barbara Smith (1693–1764), who married first, *Thomas Holdsworth* (ca. 1692–1718), and second, *Benjamin Mackall* (1675–1761). Her nephew was *Robert Hendly Courts* (?–1774). MARRIED second, in 1717 Rebecca (ca. 1695–1737), daughter of *Walter Smith* (?–1711); granddaughter of both *Richard Smith* (?–ca. 1690) and Richard Hall (?–1688), a prominent Quaker. Her brothers were Richard (?–1732); Walter (ca. 1692–1734). Her sisters were Lucy (1688–1770), who married *Thomas Brooke* (1683–1744); Eleanor (1690–1761), who married *Thomas Addison* (1679–1727); Elizabeth; Ann (1694–1759), who married second, *Thomas Trueman Greenfield* (1682–1733); and Mary. Her nephews were *Richard Brooke* (1716–1783); *John Addison* (1713–1764). Her nieces were Eleanor Brooke, who married *Samuel Beall* (ca. 1713–ca. 1778); Ann Addison (1711/12–1753), who married *William Murdock* (?–1769); and Marianne Greenfield, who married *John Stoddert* (?–1767).
