SKINNER, ADDERTON (ca. 1677–1756). BORN: ca. 1677, in Calvert County. NATIVE: second generation. RESIDED: in Calvert County. **FAMILY BACKGROUND.** FATHER: Robert Skinner (?–1686), who immigrated ca. 1658 from Bristol, a merchant and large landowner. MOTHER: Ann (?–1714), widow of James Trueman (?–1672), daughter of Arthur Storer and wife Katherine. BROTHERS: Clarke (?–ca. 1713); William, who married Elizabeth (1665–?), daughter of James Mackall (ca. 1630–1693). HALF BROTHER: **Robert Skinner** (?–ca. 1712/1713). SISTER OR HALF SISTER: Mary, who married Joseph (?–1713), son of **Thomas Letchworth** (?–1668). HALF SISTERS: Martha Trueman, who married **Thomas Greenfield** (ca. 1649–1715); Elizabeth Trueman, who married Charles Greene, an apothecary of Kings Lynn, Norfolk County, England; Ann Trueman, who married **John Bigger** (ca. 1654–1714); and Mary Trueman, who married **Thomas Hollyday** (ca. 1661–1702/3). MILITARY SERVICE: colonel, by 1752. **WEALTH DURING LIFETIME.** LAND AT FIRST ELECTION: 253 acres in Calvert County (inherited 183 acres, purchased 70 acres). SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN LAND BETWEEN FIRST ELECTION AND DEATH: acquired by patent and purchase 855 acres in Calvert County. **WEALTH AT DEATH.** DIED: between September 4 and November 20, 1756, in Calvert County. **PERSONAL PROPERTY:** size of estate unknown. **LAND:** 1,108 acres in Calvert County.

SKINNER, ROBERT (?–ca. 1712/13). BORN: in Calvert County, of age by 1686; eldest son. NATIVE: second generation. RESIDED: in Calvert County. **FAMILY BACKGROUND.** FATHER: Robert

Skinner (?–1686), who immigrated ca. 1658 from Bristol, England; a merchant and large landowner. MOTHER: Alice. STEPMOTHER: by 1676, Ann (?–1714), widow of James Trueman (?–1672), daughter of Arthur Storer. BROTHERS OR HALF BROTHERS: Clarke (?–ca. 1713); William, who married Elizabeth Mackall (1665–?). HALF BROTHER: **Adderton Skinner** (ca. 1677–1756). SISTER: Mary, who married Joseph Letchworth (?–1713), son of **Thomas Letchworth** (?–1668). STEPSISTERS: Martha Trueman, who married **Thomas Greenfield** (ca. 1649–1715); Mary Trueman, who married **Thomas Hollyday** (ca. 1661–1702/3); Elizabeth Trueman, who married Charles Green, an apothecary of Kings Lynn, Norfolk County, England; and Anne Trueman, who married **John Bigger** (ca. 1654–1714). DAUGHTER: Anne. STEPDAUGHTERS: Elizabeth Tannehill; Mary Taney (?–1712). **PRIVATE CAREER.** EDUCATION: literate. RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION: Protestant. SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES: from a prominent family and related by marriage to the strongest political families in Calvert County. OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE: planter. **PUBLIC CAREER.** LEGISLATIVE SERVICE: Lower House, Calvert County, 1704–1707 (Elections and Privileges 5), 1708A, 1708B–1711 (Laws 1). LOCAL OFFICE: justice, Calvert County, 1700–ca. 1712/13. **WEALTH DURING LIFETIME.** LAND AT FIRST ELECTION: ca. 820 acres in Calvert county (790 acres inherited from father). **WEALTH AT DEATH.** DIED: administration bond dated January 26, 1712/13, in Calvert County. **PERSONAL PROPERTY:** TEV, £861.19.8 (including 10 slaves); FB, £708.14.9. **LAND:** probably ca. 820 acres in Calvert County.

SLUBY (SLUBEY), WILLIAM (?–1799). BORN: of age by 1766. NATIVE: at least second generation. RESIDED: in Chestertown, Kent County. **FAMILY BACKGROUND.** FATHER: probably William Sluby of Kent County. BROTHER: Nicholas, a Loyalist, who resided in Kent County except for the Revolutionary War years when he moved to
