Her brothers were Richard; Benjamin; George Wells (?-1696); John; Robert; and William. Her sisters were Mary (?-1699), who married first, Thomas Stockett (?-1671); Martha; Frances; and Elizabeth. MARRIED second, ca. 1675, Mary, widow of Godfrey Harmer (?-1674), an Indian trader and interpreter in New Sweden and Maryland, daughter of Oliver Spry (?-ca. 1669) of Baltimore County and wife Johanna (?-1675). CHILDREN. STEPDAUGHTERS: Sarah Harmer; Elizabeth Harmer; and Mary Harmer, who married first, Benjamin Gundry (?by 1687), and second, James Maxwell (1662-1727/ 28). PRIVATE CAREER. STEELE (STEEL, STEELL), HENRY (ca. 1715–1782). BORN: possibly on July 22, 1715, in Whitehaven, Cumberland County, England. IMMIGRATED: from Whitehaven, Cumberland County, England, in 1740. RESIDED: near Vienna, Dorchester County. FAMILY BACKGROUND. FATHER:

possibly Isaac Steele of Whitehaven, England. MOTHER: possibly Elizabeth Beeby of Winscales at St. Michael's, Workington, England. BROTH-ERS: possibly John (1704-?), the eldest; three others (names unknown). SISTER: possibly one (name unknown). MARRIED ca. 1757 Ann, daughter of Maj. James Billings (?-1747) of Oxford, Talbot County, a merchant, and wife Ann Rider (1713-1756). Ann was the stepdaughter of Govert Lookerman (?-1753) of Dorchester County, a mariner. She was the granddaughter of John Rider (1686-1739/40) and the stepgranddaughter of Govert Lookerman (ca. 1681-1728). She was the niece of Dorothy Rider (1725-?), who married John Henry (ca. 1714-1781). She was the stepniece of Ann Hicks, who married Henry Travers (?-1765); Sarah Lookerman (?-by 1745), who married Joseph Cox Gray (?-1764). Her brothers were Thomas (ca. 1730-1753); James (ca. 1727-1747); and John (1729-1729). Her first cousins were Francis Jenkins Henry (?-1796); John Henry, Jr. (ca. 1750-1798); Charlotte Henry, who married William Winder, Jr. (?-1808); and Dolly Henry, who married Isaac Henry (?-ca. 1802).
