

Sarah (1721-?). Her half sisters were Mary Holdsworth (1713-?), who married *Benson Bond* (1710-1750); Betty Holdsworth (1715-?), who married *James Heighe* (?-1757). Her first cousin was *James John Mackall* (1717-1772). OTHER KINSHIP: Barbara was the great-granddaughter of both *Richard Smith* (?-ca. 1690) and *Henry Morgan* (ca. 1616-1663), and the great-niece of *Walter Smith* (?-1711). Her second cousins were Lucy Smith (1688-1770), who married *Thomas Brooke* (1683-1744); Eleanor Smith (1690-1761), who married *Thomas Addison* (1679-1727); and Rebecca Smith (1696-1737), who married *Daniel Dulany* (1685-1753). CHILDREN. SON: *William Mackall Wilkinson* (1751-1799). DAUGHTERS: Ann; Susanna; Sarah; and Mary. PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCATION: literate. RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION: Anglican, All Faith Parish, St. Mary's County. SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES: Gent., by 1755. OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE: probably planter. PUBLIC CAREER. LEGISLATIVE SERVICE: Lower House, Charles County, 1742-1744 (Elections 1), 1745, 1745/46-1748. LOCAL OFFICES: justice, Charles County, 1732-1739; churchwarden, All Faith Parish, St. Mary's County, 1734; All Faith Parish Vestry, St. Mary's County, 1737. WEALTH DURING LIFETIME. LAND AT FIRST ELECTION: at least 250 acres in Charles County (150 acres inherited from his grandfather, 100 acres by purchase). SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN LAND BETWEEN FIRST ELECTION AND DEATH: purchased ca. 2,100 acres in Prince George's and Charles counties, 1742-1743. WEALTH AT DEATH. DIED: between September 29, 1754, and April 24, 1755. PERSONAL PROPERTY: TEV, at least £1,228.14.4 current money (including 24 slaves, books, a water mill, and plate). LAND: ca. 2,300 acres in Charles and Prince George's counties.

WILKINSON, WILLIAM MACKALL (1751-1799). BORN: on September 13, 1751. NATIVE: fourth generation. RESIDED: in Benedict Hundred, Charles County. FAMILY BACKGROUND. FATHER: *William Wilkinson* (?-1755). MOTHER: Barbara (1722-1757), daughter of *Benjamin Mackall* (1675-1761) and wife Barbara Smith (1693-1764). Barbara Smith married first, *Thomas Holdsworth* (ca. 1692-1718). UNCLE: *Benjamin Mackall, Jr.* (ca. 1723-1795). AUNT: Susannah Wilkinson (?-1774), who married *John Addison* (1713-1764). HALF AUNTS: Mary Holdsworth (1713-?), who married *Benson Bond* (1710-1750); Betty Holdsworth (1715-?), who married *James Heighe* (?-1757). OTHER KINSHIP: great-grandfather, *Walter Smith* (?-1711). MARRIED on February 24, 1774. Ann

Herbert Dent (1756-1813), daughter of *John Dent, of George* (ca. 1733-1809) and wife Sarah Marshall (1735-1795). Ann was the granddaughter of *George Dent* (1690-1754). She was the niece of *George Dent* (?-1785); Elizabeth Dent, who married second, *Richard Harrison* (?-1780); Rebecca Dent (1735-1770), who married *Thomas Hanson Marshall* (1731-1801); and *Thomas Hanson Marshall* (1731-1801). Her brothers were *George Dent* (ca. 1758-1813); Thomas M. (1761-1823). Her sister was Elizabeth (1754-died young). ADDITIONAL COMMENT: Ann resided in Adams County, Mississippi, at death. CHILDREN. SONS: George Francis; William. DAUGHTERS: Jane; Barbara, and Sarah. PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCATION: literate. RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION: parents were Anglican. SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES: Gent., by 1778; Esq., by 1786. OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE: planter. PUBLIC CAREER. LEGISLATIVE SERVICE: Lower House, Charles County, 1782-1783. MILITARY SERVICE: captain, Lower Battalion, Prince George's County Militia, 1777. WEALTH DURING LIFETIME. PERSONAL PROPERTY: assessed value £828.0.0, including 14 slaves and 12 oz. plate, 1783; 29 slaves, 1790; 30 slaves, 1798. LAND AT FIRST ELECTION: 1,813 acres in Charles and Prince George's counties (1,313 acres inherited from his father, 500 acres by purchase). ADDITIONAL COMMENT: At age nineteen, William applied to have his guardianship changed from his uncle, *Benjamin Mackall, Jr.* (ca. 1723-1795), to Thomas Truman. Mackall then paid £209.0.0 to William as fourteen years' profits from 1,313 acres, William's inheritance from his father that had been administered by Mackall. This sum was less than William thought was due him, and the court agreed. In 1790 the court ordered Mackall to pay a final judgment of £1,624.4.9 to his nephew. SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN LAND BETWEEN FIRST ELECTION AND DEATH: purchased 130 acres in Charles County, 1784; mortgaged 1,592 acres in Charles County to pay his debts, 1790; sold 348 acres in Prince George's County, 1784, and 646 acres in Charles County, 1798; owned 948 acres in Charles County in 1798. WEALTH AT DEATH. DIED: on March 12, 1799; will probated in Charles County. PERSONAL PROPERTY: TEV, £2,110.19.6 current money (including 31 slaves and a water mill); FB, estate overpaid £753.1.0. LAND: 948 acres in Charles County.

WILLAN, RICHARD (ca. 1622-1663). BORN: ca. 1622, probably in England. IMMIGRATED: in 1638, probably as a free adult. RESIDED: in St. Mary's
