Resolution in favor of Margaret Lamb.

Passed Feb. 11, 1835

Resolved, by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the Treasurer of the Western Shore, pay to Margaret Lamb, the widow of Richard White, a soldier of the revolution, the full pay of a private, in quarterly payments, during her life.

No. 12.

Resolution in relation to the State's Wharfinger, in the city of Baltimore. Passed Mar. 16,

*Resolved, by the General Assembly of Maryland, That from and after the adoption of this resolution, it shall be the duty of the State's Wharfinger, in the city of Baltimore, to lay off, designate, and set apart so much of the State's wharves on Dugan's and O'Donnell's docks, as the inspectors of tobacco at the State's tobacco warehouses may deem necessary to facilitate the receiving and delivering of tobacco, provided the same shall not exceed one hundred and fifty feet at any one warehouse; and where portions thereof shall be so designated, they shall be under the control of said inspectors, and the State's wharfinger aforesaid, is hereby required to keep the same free from intrusion by other vessels than those engaged in the tobacco trade, *Provided also*, that nothing contained in this resolution, shall be so construed as to interfere with the steam boats Maryland and Patuxent, nor any other vessel that may resort to these wharves, except so far as to keep those portions designated for the use and accommodation of each, free from being interfered with or molested by others, any law to the contrary notwithstanding.*

AND WHEREAS, the State's wharf, at the head of the basin, is only eighty two feet long, Therefore:

Resolved, That the State's wharfinger be, and he is hereby authorised and required to designate and set apart the whole of said wharf for the convenience of vessels engaged in the tobacco trade, and the said wharf, when so designated, shall be under the control of the Inspector of Tobacco, at said wharf, and the said wharfinger is hereby required to
