

*Mexico*, there haue beene and are yet dayly yeare by yeare, brought thence to *Seuill*, 5. or 600. thousand Hides at a time: Goates likewise may be had from the Ilands nigh at hand; as many, as shall be desired. Besides these, there are Muske-rats, Squirrels, Beauers, Badgers, Foxes, Martins, Pole-cats, Wesels and Minkfes; which yet hurt not the Poultry, nor their Egges. Among their Birds, the Eagle is the greatest deuourer. Hawkes there are of sundry sorts; which all prey commonly vpon fish: Sparrow-hawkes, Lanerets, Gosse-hawkes, Falcons, and Osperaies. Partridges not much bigger then our Quailes: but haue beene' seene a hundred in a Coauic. Infinite store of wild Turkeyes, nigh as big againe as our tame. There are Owls and Black-birds with red shoulders, Thrushes, and diuers sorts of smaller Birds, some redde, some blew, scarce so bigge as Wrens. In winter, is great plenty of Swannes, Cranes, and Pigeons, Herons, Geese, Brants, Ducks, Wigeon, Dottrell, Oxeis, Parrots, and much other fowle vnknowne in our parts. Limonds thrive wonderfully there, Apricookes and Meli-Cottrons, come in such abundance, as a Gentleman in Towne protested hee cast a hundred bushels to the Hogs this last yeare, he had so many more then hee could spend. It hath Chochas and Garvanzas, and is excellent for Beanes, Pease, and all manner of Pults and Rootes: whereof Pease in ten dayes rise 14. inches high. The Corne is very plentiful in each of three Haruests in the same yeare, yeelding in greatest pcurie two hundred for one, in ordinary yeares five or sixe hundred, and in the better, fiftene or sixteene hundred for one: which increase of Corne beeing so great, it is very easie to keepe all manner of Poultry and Fowle for the Table all the yeare long. This Corne maketh good bread and beere. It is likely all the fruites of *Italy* will agree with that Soyle, as Figs, Melons, Pomegranates, Oranges, Oliues, Berenjenas,
