Resolution in favor of Sarah Scrivner, of the City of Baltimore. Passed Feb. 27,
1839.

Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the Treasurer of the Western Shore be, and he is hereby directed to pay to Sarah Scrivner, of the city of Baltimore, the former widow of William Whitaker, a soldier of the revolution, or to her order, the half pay of a private of the revolution, during her life, commencing on the first day of January, eighteen hundred and thirty-eight, in quarterly payments.

No. 25.

Resolution authorising the Secretary of State to cause alterations or repairs to be made in the new tobacco warehouse situated on Conway and Charles streets in Baltimore. Passed Mar. 2,
1839.

Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the Secretary of State, be and he is hereby authorized to cause such alterations or repairs to be made in the new tobacco warehouse, situated on Conway and Charles streets in the city of Baltimore, by substituting iron shutters and doors for the wooden ones therein, or directing all the openings in said building fronting upon the lumber yard thereto adjoining, to be closed, whichever in his opinion will best protect it from danger by fire, and he is hereby authorized to draw upon the treasury for the amount necessary to carry this resolution into effect, payable out of the tobacco fund paid by said warehouse into the treasury.
