

Governor's Commission of 1966 to Study the Needs of Handicapped Children, such Commission to be active for at least five years, the members to serve for alternating terms in the discretion of the Governor, and the Commission to be supplied with the necessary staff to accomplish the responsibilities set forth in this resolution; and be it further

Resolved, that the Commission be composed of representatives of the State Departments of Education, Health, Juvenile Services, Mental Hygiene, and Public Welfare and the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation, a member of the staff of an independent voluntary school for handicapped children, two representatives from the public school systems of the several political subdivisions, a representative from the School for the Blind or the Maryland School for the Deaf, two interested and cognizant citizens (at least one of whom is a parent of a handicapped child), a member of each of the Houses of the General Assembly, and a Juvenile Court Judge, and be it further

Resolved, that the Governor is requested to provide in the supplemental budget for fiscal year 1968 or from contingent funds at his disposal the sum of \$35,000 for the said Commission in fiscal year 1968 for professional personnel, necessary supplies and services.

(House Joint Resolution 5)

House Joint Resolution requesting the immediate establishment of at least two ~~rest area-tourist~~ HIGHWAY TRAVEL information centers by the State Roads Commission.

WHEREAS, as the American and Maryland economies prosper and grow, an ever increasing number of people have larger amounts of leisure time and money; and

WHEREAS, more and more people take trips away from their homes on a regular basis to both nearby and distant destinations and for many sorts of reasons; and

WHEREAS, many of these trips provide incentives and suggestions for destinations for future trips; and

WHEREAS, any state can and should profit by taking maximum advantage of the aforementioned facts; and

WHEREAS, Maryland has not heretofore availed itself of all the potential means of telling travelers about the wonderful variety of attractions within her boundaries; and

WHEREAS, offering pleasant and interesting rest area-information centers would promote safer driving habits as well as advertising the State; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the State Roads Commission be requested and urged by the General Assembly
