Senate Bill No. 370—By Senators Hall and Bailey:

An Act to repeal and re-enact, with amendments, Section 19(5) of Article 56 of the Annotated Code of Maryland (1972 Replacement Volume), title "Licenses," subtitle "Pinball Machines and Console Machines," [[and to add new Subsection 19(5)(E) to same. To ] to authorize the licensing of free play and console pinball machines in certain counties of the State, and to impose additional license fees therein in Anne Arundel County.

Dear Mr. President:

In accordance with Article II, Section 17, of the Maryland Constitution, I have today vetoed Senate Bill 374.

This bill provides that the various rules, regulations or standards of the several agencies of the Executive Department shall be invalid until submitted to the Committee on Administrative, Executive and Legislative Review.

House Bill 436, which was enacted by the General Assembly and signed by me on May 24, 1973, accomplishes the same purposes as Senate Bill 374 and is more clearly worded. Furthermore, the sponsor of Senate Bill 374 has advised my office that he believes the language of House Bill 436 to be preferable to that of Senate Bill 374, and that, therefore, the Senate Bill should be vetoed.

Consequently, I have decided to veto Senate Bill 374.
