thousand men as the exigency may in his judgment require, and said militia when so ordered to prepare for actual service shall be organized, officered, armed and equipped in pursuance of the laws and regulations governing the United States volunteer forces; and the commander-in-chief is hereby vested with the full power and authority to make all needful rules and regulations in the premises.

- SEC. 11. And be it enacted, That the militia accepted by the Governor and all officers thereof, and staff officers when called into actual service, shall be entitled to such pay and emoluments as are, or shall be allowed to the officers, non-commissioned officers and privates in the United States army from the time of their acceptance as tooops of the State.
- SEC. 12. And be it enacted, That the salaries of the several department officers shall be as follows, to wit: the adjutant general shall receive, so long as he discharges the duties of quartermaster general, inspector general and commissary general, as herein before provided, the pay of two thousand dollars per annum payable as heretofore; the aids-de-camp to the Governor shall rank as lieutenant colonel, but shall not be entitled to any compensation or allowances except for their expenses when employed on special service, and shall hold their commissions at the pleasure of the Governor.
- Sec. 13. And be it enacted, That the sum of ten thousand dollars be and the same is hereby appropriated to enable the Governor to carry into effect the several provisions of this act, and he is hereby fully authorized to apply the said fund in such manner as will in his judgment best effectuate the several purposes of this Act.
- SEC. 14. And be it enacted, That in all cases of emergency, where money may be wanted to organize, furnish or supply the militia of this State who may be called into active service, the Governor is hereby authorized to draw his warrant on the State Treasurer for such sum or sums of money not exceeding fifty thousand dollars, and to dispose of it in such manner as the exigency of the case may require, and at the next meeting of the general assembly thereafter, make a full statement of the amount drawn under the provision of this section and the manner of its disbursement.
- SEC. 15. And be it enacted, That should the President of the United States at any time make a requisition for part of the militia of this State for the public service, the adjutant general shall take the most prompt and efficacious measures for supplying the number of men required, for providing them with all necessary arms, equipments, ammunition and provisions, and for having them marched to the place or places of rendezvous, and shall call them by brigades, regiments or
