

The committee to whom was referred the petition of Colonel Joseph Isaac, of the 34th regiment of Maryland militia, praying to be released from the payment of a fine inflicted on him by a general court-martial, have had the same under consideration, and beg leave to recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That Joseph Isaac, Colonel of the 34th regiment of Maryland militia, be and he is hereby released from the fine imposed by a general court-martial.

Mr. Howard delivers the following report:

The committee to whom was referred the bill from the senate entitled, "An additional supplement to the act, entitled, An act for the better regulation of the militia of the city of Baltimore," report the same with the following amendment: Add the following to the 2d section—"Provided always, that nothing contained in this act shall be construed to interfere with the rights or privileges of any other regiment of artillery, already organized, or to deprive any such regiment of any arms, which it is now entitled to hold under the existing laws."

Mr. Tyson obtained leave to bring in a bill, entitled, An act to incorporate a company to make a canal from York Haven, in Pennsylvania, to the city of Baltimore. Ordered, That Messrs. Tyson, Howard, Merrick, Sewell and Goldsborough, report the same.

The clerk of the senate delivers a bill, entitled, An act relating to what gold and silver coin shall be a legal tender in this state, endorsed 'will pass;' which was read and referred to Messrs. McCulloh, Howard and Goldsborough.

And the following message:

By the Senate, March 3, 1825.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates.

The senate concur with you in the opinion that it is as proper to inspect, 'poplar lumber as lumber of any other kind,' but deem it unnecessary to legislate upon the subject, believing that sufficient provision is made by the act of 1811, ch. 70, and the supplement to that act passed in 1817, ch. 141. They therefore adhere to their rejection of the bill, entitled, A further supplement to an act regulating the inspection of lumber.
