

Insert as the 5th section the following:

Sec. 5. Be it enacted, that each and every member of the levy court of said county hereafter; shall be entitled to receive for each and every day he shall attend as a member of said court, the sum of one dollar and fifty cents, and in addition thereto an allowance of six and a quarter cents per mile for every mile that his place of residence shall be distant from the place of holding the levy court of said county, and that he shall be entitled to receive mileage for each and every day, he shall attend as a member of said court.

Provided, that nothing in this act contained shall be construed to allow any member of said court mileage in returning to his residence.

Insert as 6th section the following:

Sec. 6. And be it enacted, that from and after the formation of this act, the levy court of Kent county, shall and they are hereby authorised to appoint their own clerk; and it shall not be lawful for the said clerk, to have or receive for his services to the said court, more than the per diem allowance to any one member of said court.

Add the following proviso at the end of the bill.

Provided nevertheless, that at the next election of delegates to the General Assembly for Kent county, every voter when he offers to vote, shall be required by the judges of elections to state whether he is for or against the abolition at the office of commissioners of tax of said county, and the said judges shall record the number of votes for and against the abolition at the office of commissioners of the tax aforesaid, and make return thereof to the next legislature during the first week of the session, and if a majority of the said votes shall be in favour of the abolition of the commissioners of the tax of the aforesaid county, then and in that case, the said act shall be valid for said county, otherwise of no effect whatever.

Which were severally read;

The house then resumed the consideration of the bill, reported by Mr. Harris, entitled, a supplement to an act, entitled, an act for the preservation of the wild fowl in the Potomac river, and its tributary streams, passed at December session 1832, chap. 134;

The question before the house being upon the amendment as offered by Mr. Hopewell;
