

Mr. Maulsby, from the committee on grievances and courts of justice, reported a bill, entitled, an act declaratory of the law concerning contempts of court in this State,

Which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Kerr, from the committee on grievances and courts of justice, to which was referred the bill from the senate, entitled, an act to make valid a certain deed therein mentioned, reported the same without amendment,

Which was read the first time,—And,

On motion of Mr. Kerr, read the second time by special order.

Mr. Alexander moved to recommit the bill;

Determined in the negative.

On motion of Mr. Alexander,

Said bill was then amended, by adding at the end thereof the following, "or purchasers from them or either of them;"

Mr. Dawson then moved to amend said bill by striking out the proviso thereof,

Determined in the negative.

The question then recurred, and was put, shall the said bill pass?

Resolved in the affirmative.

Mr. Boyd, from the committee on divorces, reported a bill, entitled, an act to divorce Elizabeth Harvey, of Baltimore city, from her husband, Joseph Harvey;

Which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Worthington reported a bill, entitled, an act to repeal so much of the act to limit and define the jurisdiction of justices of the peace, passed at December session, 1834, as relates to Baltimore county;

Which was read the first, and by a special order the second time, and passed.

The bill reported by Mr. Shower, entitled, an act to authorise John Lammott, former collector in the third collection district in Baltimore county, to complete his collections,

Was taken up for consideration, read the second time, and passed:

The hour having arrived for taking up the order of the day, the house proceeded to consider the bill reported by Mr. Ridgely, entitled, an act, supplemental to an act, entitled, an act for the relief of the heirs of Jane White, late of the city of Baltimore.
