G. No. 81, folio 562;''

Read the first time, and referred to the committee on Judicial Proceedings.

A bill entitled, "An Act to amend section 92 of article 17 of the Code of Public Local Laws, entitled 'Queen Anne's county,' relating to justices of the peace and constables, and re-enact the same with amendments;''

Read the first time and referred to Messrs. Crane, Kemp and Purnell.

A bill entitled, "An Act to empower the county commissioners of Montgomery county to re-open and adjust the claims of Elijah Thompson for damages on road, and to levy an additional sum of money that they may think rightly due him for damages as aforesaid;''

Read the first time and referred to Messrs. Waters, Ohr and Rowles.

A bill entitled, "An Act to authorise the county commissioners of Kent and Queen Anne's counties to employ some person to repair the bridge over Chester river at Crumpton, to levy sufficient money to pay for the same, and to make provision for future repairs to said bridge;''

Read the first time, and referred to Messrs. Crane, Ricaud and Kemp.

A bill entitled, "An Act to ratify and confirm and make valid the action of the county commissioners of Harford county in levying a special tax upon the assessable property of said county, to raise a sum of money to be appropriated to the payment of bounties to volunteers in the armies of the United States, and to carry the same into effect;''

Read the first time and referred to the committee on Finance.
