A HEROINE.—At Pileau, in Prussia, now lives a woman who has for years consecrated her life to the noble and dangerous task of rescuing persons from drowning. Whenever a tempest comes on, day or night, Catherine Kleinfeldt, who is the widow of a sailor, is ready with a boat, in which she puts out to sea, and frequently goes farther than any other, in order to give help to those who may be shipwrecked. More than three hundred individuals have been saved by her efforts; and accustomed for twenty years to make voyages with her husband, she possesses a skill and hardihood that renders these efforts unusually successful. When she is seen, the greatest respect is paid to her, and the sailors regard her as their guardian angel; the very children of the fishermen go upon their knees to her, and kiss the skirts of her dress. The Prussian and other governments have decreed her medals, and the Principality of Pileau has made her an honorary citizen for life. She is about sixty years of age, with an athletic figure and great strength, (a Grace Darling enlarged into gigantic proportions); she has a masculine countenance, which, however, is softened by the benevolent expression that it constantly wears.
