Francis Arkell aged 22th year old doth hereabouts make oath that he
was present when Leonard Calvert Esq^r made his Will in his last sick-
ness in manner following by word of mouth Viz^t that he did
nominate M^{rs} Margaret Brent his Sole Executrix.

Ed. M^{rs} Mary Brent doth to the same, and further she doth say
that he did desire that his Executrix should give the first Marschall
that shall fall within this year (and if none fall within this year
then the first Marschall that shall hereafter fall) unto M^r Thom-
as Green Esq^r of Virginia -

June 19th This Day came Margaret Brent Esq^r and desired
the Testimony of the said Govern^r M^r Thomas Green concerning
the last will and Testament of the late Govern^r Leonard Calvert Esq^r.
The said Gov^r did authorize Giles Brent Esq^r one of his Judges
Councill to administer an oath unto him the said Governour
concerning the fore said business. -

The said Gov^r Thomas Green Esq^r answered upon oath concerning
the last will and Testament of the late Govern^r Leonard Calvert Esq^r that he the
said Gov^r Calvert lying upon his death bed some 6 hours before
his death being in perfect memory directing his Speech to
M^{rs} Margaret Brent said in presence of him the said M^r Green
and some of his I make you my Sole Executrix take all and pay
all. after which words he the said Gov^r Calvert desired Every one to
depart the room and was some space in private but afterwards
M^{rs} Margaret Brent Esq^r afterwards the P^m & Persons coming
into the room again, he heard the said M^r Gov^r Calvert appoint
certain Legacies in Manner following Viz^t I give my wearing
Coats to James & Richard and Richard Wilton my servants spe-
cifying his Coats Suit to Richard Wilton and his black Suit to
James.

 I give and bequeath to my Godson Geo. Proove, also he did desire that his
 should give me the first mare Colt that should fall this year (and if none

66. June 21. William Tompson Exhibited the last will and Testament of
 Robert Tutty and desires to prove the same.

William Bretton saith upon oath that he was present when Rob. Tutty
 made his last Will & signed it with his own hand and that the Will
 Exhibited by William Thomson Esq. is the right Will.

Thomas Jackson being also present at the same time deposes that the said
 the Will being proved by the Testinours afo. the said William Thom-
 desires to be admitted to Enter upon the Estate of Rob. Tutty and
 and to have granted unto him Letters of Administration of all the
 Robts goods & Chattles within this Province belonging unto the
 Robert Tutty.

Ordered by the Gov. that the said William Thomson shall have
 of adminⁿ of all the Robts Lands goods and Chattles belonging to
 Robt Tutty afo. Granted unto him forthwith.

It. my bed I give to Mr. Thomson.

It. My hoggs to be divided betwixt Mr. Thomson, and Joseph Cade
 only one young sow, to be Given to Shilley another.
