Governor Buys House

In City Costing \$46,000

Governor McKeldin has a new home in Baltimore—an eight-room, two-story, stone dwelling at 10 Charlote place.

The home was purchased for \$46,000 from Charles F. Lechthaler, said the Governor, and will be leased out after Mr. Lechthaler moves in May.

The other home currently owned by the Governor—a three-story, stucco house at 203 Paddington road—will be offered for

sale at a price which "probably will be over \$40,000," said the Governor.

The Paddington road dwelling has been leased for the last four years, while the Governor and his family lived in the Executive Mansion in Annapolis.

The choice of the new house

was made by Mrs. McKeldin and the children, said the Governor.

"I just seconded their motion," he added.

One of the main attractions of the new home as far as Mrs. McKeldin and her daughter, Clara, were concerned, is a powder room on the first floor, said the Governor.

He added that there are also eight rooms in the house and another room over an adjoining double-car garage.

He said the house will be leased "for four years"—the time of his remaining tenure as Governor.
