Mr. Bannan's Successor.

Chairman Compton has appointed Dr. George Wells a member of the State central committee from Anne Arundel county, to succeed the late Michael Bannan. This would seem to indicate a complete restoration of harmony in Anne Arundel politics and of the political relations between Dr. Wells and Mr. Compton, which, it is stated, were somewhat strained because Dr. Wells was not appointed collector of internal revenue during Mr. Cleveland's administration and while Mr. Compton was in Congress. An Anne Arundel county politician said that the appointment might lead to the support of Mr. Compton's candidacy for Congress by Dr. Wells. The CAPITAL suggested the name of Dr. Wells for this position some days ago, although the Dr. stated that he was no applicant for the place, we believed at the time, and do so now, that he was the most available man for the position in the county, and that it could do more to unify the Democratic party in this county than any thing else. Coming as it does from Mr. Compton, it has great significance.
