# Princeton Honors Shore Man Due Rhodes Scholarship

Princeton, N.J., Feb. 22—The highest general distinction Princeton University can confer upon an undergraduate, the M. Taylor Pyne Honor Prize, was awarded today to a 21-year-old senior, Paul S. Sarbanes, Rhodes Scholar-elect, of Salisbury, Md. The prize was

presented by President Harold W. Dodds at the fortieth annual midwinter meeting of the Princeton National Alumni Association.

1877, trustee and benefactor of the university, the Pyne Honor Prize is given each year to the senior who in the opinion of the university authorities has most clearly demonstrated "excellent scholarship, manly qualities and effective support of the best interests of the university."

In making the presentation today in the Dillon Gymnasium before nearly 1,000 persons, President Dodds praised Sarbanes, chairman of the Undergraduate Council, campus governing body, for his outstanding leadership, stating that "under Sarbanes' direction the Undergraduate Council has further increased in effectiveness and prestige and has assumed additional responsibility for the conduct of student affairs."

Sarbanes, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Spyros Sarbanes, Ocean City road, Salisbury, a high honor student in the Woodrow Wilson School of Public and International Affairs, has been a member of the Undergraduate Council for the past three years and this year has served as council chairman as well as secretary of the Class of 1954.
