Authorities arrest man sought in 3 Waverly killings

A Baltimore County man being sought in last month's triple fatal shooting in Waverly was arrested yesterday afternoon in a house less than a mile from the slaying scene.

Otis Edwards III, 25, of the first block of Dowling Circle in Hillendale was arrested about 3:30 p.m. in the 1800 block of E. 28th St. by members of the Police Department's Warrant Apprehension Task Force and agents with the U.S. marshal's office.

Edwards was charged with three counts of first-degree murder in the deaths of Tony Blizzard Jr., 18, Jamal Fisher, 18, and Donte Weddington, 25, who were shot while sitting in a car Feb. 24 at East 29th and Mathews streets.

Fired housing worker is charged with fraud

A Baltimore housing authority employee was indicted yesterday on charges that he stole personal information about his colleagues and used it to obtain credit cards and rack up bills of more than \$20,000, according to city prosecutors and housing officials.

Officials said Steven L. Harris, 33, of the 1300 block of Ashland Ave., his brother and two others were involved in the scheme, which began in October and ended when they were arrested in January. Harris, a 12-year municipal employee, has been fired.

He is charged with credit card fraud, financial identity fraud and theft, as are William Harris, 37, of the 1000 block of Valley St.; Dorothy Parker, 40, of the 400 block of Valley St.; and Lyndon Johnson, 33, of the 1300 block of Bonsal St.

Man killed on playground in suspected drug robbery

A man was shot and killed early yesterday on a Southwest Baltimore playground during what police said was an incident involving drugs.

Calvin Drake, 34, of the 900 block of N. Rosedale St., was allegedly selling drugs in the playground, off the 700 block of N. Longwood St., shortly after midnight, said Agent Angelique Cook-Hayes, a police spokeswoman.

Cook-Hayes said a gunman approached Drake and either robbed or attempted to rob him, and then shot him in the chest. Drake was pronounced dead on arrival at Maryland Shock Trauma Center.

Circuit Judge Holland takes over family division

Baltimore Circuit Judge Marcella A. Holland took over the helm of the court's family division this week, court officials announced yesterday.

Holland, 53, succeeded Judge Albert J. Matricciani Jr., who will head a new division for business and technology cases. A former prosecutor, Holland was appointed to the bench in 1997 by Gov. Parris N. Glendening.

She will oversee all programs provided by the family division, such as parent education, mediation for child custody and visitation, and domestic violence. Holland and three court masters make up the division.
